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AN ACT

To repeal section 701.302, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof three new sections relating to the children's environmental health and protection advisory council.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 701.302, RSMo, is repealed and three new sections 2 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 192.990, 192.992, and 192.994, 3 to read as follows:

192.990. 1. There is hereby established within the department of
health and senior services the "Children's Environmental Health and
Protection Advisory Council". The council shall consist of twenty-three
members that are residents of this state. The members of the council
shall include:

6 (1) Two members of the senate, one from each of the major 7 political parties, appointed by the president pro tempore of the senate, 8 to serve for a term of two years;

9 (2) Two members of the house of representatives, one from each 10 of the major political parties, appointed by the speaker of the house of 11 representatives, to serve for a term of two years;

12 (3) The director of the department of health and senior services,
13 or the director's designee, who shall serve as chairperson;

14 (4) The director of the department of social services, or the
15 director's designee;

16 (5) The director of the department of agriculture, or the 17 director's designee;

18 (6) The director of the department of natural resources, or the
19 director's designee;

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20 (7) The commissioner of the department of elementary and 21 secondary education, or the commissioner's designee;

(8) The director of the department of economic development, or
the director's designee;

(9) One licensed pediatric health care provider with expertise in
the field of children's environmental health and expertise with
toxicology, appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of
the senate, to serve for a term of two years;

(10) One licensed pediatric health care provider with expertise
in the field of children's environmental health and expertise with
epidemiology, appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent
of the senate, to serve for a term of two years;

(11) One representative of a local public health agency,
appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate,
to serve for a term of two years;

(12) One parent or guardian whose child has been clinically
diagnosed as having been exposed to environmental health hazards
including lead paint or pesticides, appointed by the governor, with the
advice and consent of the senate, to serve for a term of two years;

(13) One economist skilled in measuring the economic costs of
illness and the benefits of prevention, appointed by the governor, with
the advice and consent of the senate, to serve for a term of two years;

42 (14) One individual employed in the field of lead abatement,
43 appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate,
44 to serve for a term of three years;

(15) One individual from private industry with expertise in
pesticides, appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of
the senate, to serve for a term of three years;

(16) An employee of a public school district whose duties include
working with children's environmental health issues, appointed by the
governor, with the advice and consent of the senate, to serve for a term
of three years;

52 (17) An employee of a private school whose duties include 53 working with children's environmental health issues, appointed by the 54 governor, with the advice and consent of the senate, to serve for a term 55 of three years;

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(18) Two representatives of public interest organizations

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of three years;

promoting environmental health and advocating for the protection of 5758children's health, one of whom shall have knowledge and experience regarding the effects of lead poisoning, appointed by the governor, with 59the advice and consent of the senate, to serve for a term of three years; 60 61 (19) One representative of an organization that represents or 62 advocates on behalf of tenants or tenant rights, appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate, to serve for a term

65(20) The chairperson of the children's services commission, or the chairperson's designee. 66

2. Members of the council shall be appointed by February 1, 67 2007. Any vacancy on the council shall be filled in the same manner as 68 the original appointment. After the initial members are appointed, any 69 subsequent member appointed by the governor shall serve for a term 7071of three years. The council shall sunset on June 30, 2012, unless 72reauthorized by the general assembly.

192.992. 1. Members shall serve without compensation but shall, 2 subject to appropriations, be reimbursed for reasonable and necessary 3 expenses actually incurred in the performance of the member's official 4 duties.

 $\mathbf{5}$ 2. The department of health and senior services shall, subject to appropriation, provide administrative support and staff as necessary 6 7 for the operation of the council.

8 3. Subject to the availability of funds, the advisory council may 9 contract with consultants.

10 4. Meetings shall be at the call of the chairperson, or at the call 11 of the majority of the advisory council.

192.994. 1. Any state department which receives a fiscal note 2 request on proposed legislation that may impact environmental hazards that affect the health of children shall send a copy of such request to 3 the council for review. 4

 $\mathbf{5}$ 2. Any state department that is proposing a rule, regulation, or standard which may impact environmental hazards that affect the 6 7 health of children shall send such rule, regulation, or standard to the council for review. 8

3. The advisory council shall:

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10(1) Hold public hearings to gather information from the general

11 public on issues pertaining to children's environmental health and12 protection;

(2) Evaluate existing children's environmental health programs
and identify any children's environmental health issues that are not
currently being addressed;

16 (3) Recommend policies to respond to unaddressed issues
17 involving children's environmental health;

(4) Recommend uniform guidelines for state agencies to follow
to help reduce and eliminate children's exposure to environmental
hazards, especially in areas reasonably accessible to children;

(5) Gather and disseminate information to the public including the research and medical communities, community-based organizations, schools, and state agencies on how to reduce, treat, and eliminate children's exposures to environmental hazards and to further the public's understanding of the environmental hazards that may potentially affect children;

(6) Recommend education programs, in partnership with health
and environmental professionals, for parents, guardians, and caregivers
of children that include information on:

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(a) The potential health effects of environmental hazards;

31 (b) Practical suggestions on how to reduce children's exposure

33 (c) Any existing scientific research regarding the reactions of
 34 children to environmental contaminants; and

35 (d) Lead poisoning;

36 (7) Identify additional resources, either through a tax or fee
37 structure, to implement programs necessary to address children's
38 environmental health problems and issues;

(8) Assign one staff support person to review all proposed 39 legislation sent to the council, to determine if such legislation may 40impact environmental hazards that affect the health of children, and 41 shall refer any such proposed legislation to the subcommittee 42established in subdivision (11) of subsection 1 of this section which 43shall review such legislation to determine any impact on environmental 44hazards that affect the health of children, and to determine if such 45legislation adequately protects the health of children from 46environmental hazards, and shall report any recommendations to the 47

general assembly prior to the time that such legislation is debated bythe body in which the legislation originated;

50(9) Review all proposed rules, regulations, and standards within thirty days after such rule, regulation, or standard is published in the 51Missouri Register, to determine any impact on environmental hazards 52that affect the health of children, and to determine if the proposed rule, 53regulation, or standard adequately protects the health of children from 54environmental hazards, and shall report any recommendations within 55the thirty-day period to the department that is promulgating such rule, 56regulation, or standards, and shall send a copy of such recommendation 57to the joint committee on administrative rules; 58

(10) Provide recommendations regarding section 143.1006, RSMo,
and sections 701.304, 701.305, 701.306, 701.308, 701.309, 701.311, 701.312,
701.313, 701.314, 701.317, 701.320, 701.328, and 701.337, RSMo, to enhance
Missouri's ability to reduce children's exposure to lead;

63 (11) Establish a subcommittee, which shall work in conjunction with the department of health and senior services to determine which 64 65existing statutes and regulations shall be reviewed by the council in 66 addition to the statutory sections enumerated in the subdivision (10) of 67 subsection 1 of this section, and once determined, the council shall 68 review such statutes and regulations to determine any impact on environmental hazards that affect the health of children, and shall 69 70report any recommendations to the general assembly within a 71reasonable time:

4. The department of health and senior services may accept on behalf of the council any federal funds, gifts, donations from individuals, private organizations, and foundations, and any other funds that may become available.

[701.302. 1. There is hereby established the "Advisory $\mathbf{2}$ Committee on Lead Poisoning". The members of the committee 3 shall consist of twenty-seven persons who shall be appointed by the 4 governor with the advice and consent of the senate, except as otherwise provided in this subsection. At least five of the members $\mathbf{5}$ of the committee shall be African-Americans or representatives of 6 7 other minority groups disproportionately affected by lead 8 poisoning. The members of the committee shall include: 9 (1) The director of the department of health and senior 10 services or the director's designee, who shall serve as an ex officio 11 member; 12(2) The director of the department of economic development 13or the director's designee, who shall serve as an ex officio member; 14(3) The director of the department of natural resources or 15the director's designee, who shall serve as an ex officio member; (4) The director of the department of social services or the 1617director's designee, who shall serve as an ex officio member;

(6) One member of the senate, appointed by the president

27 (8) A member of a city council, county commission or other28 local governmental entity;

(9) A representative of a community housing organization;
(10) A representative of property owners;
(11) A representative of the real estate industry;

57	2. The committee shall make recommendations relating to

62	(4) Prevent lead poisoning in children;
63	(5) Maintain and increase laboratory capacity for lead
64	assessments and screening, and a quality control program for
65	laboratories;
66	(6) Abate lead problems after discovery;
67	(7) Identify additional resources, either through a tax or fee
68	structure, to implement programs necessary to address lead

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poisoning problems and issues;

70 (8) Provide an educational program on lead poisoning for
71 the general public and health care providers;

(9) Determine procedures for the removal and disposal of all
lead contaminated waste in accordance with the Toxic Substances
Control Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 2681, et seq., solid waste and
hazardous waste statutes, and any other applicable federal and
state statutes and regulations.

3. The committee members shall receive no compensation
but shall, subject to appropriations, be reimbursed for actual and
necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. All
public members and local officials shall serve for a term of two
years and until their successors are selected and qualified, and
other members shall serve for as long as they hold the office or
position from which they were appointed.

4. No later than December fifteenth of each year, the committee shall provide a written annual report of its recommendations for actions as required pursuant to subsection 2 of this section to the governor and general assembly, including any legislation proposed by the committee to implement the recommendations.
