AN ACT

To repeal section 192.935, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof two new sections relating to vision examinations for school children.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 192.935, RSMo, is repealed and two new sections 2 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 167.195 and 192.935, to read as 3 follows:

167.195. 1. Beginning July 1, 2008, every child enrolling in kindergarten or first grade in a public elementary school in this state shall receive one comprehensive vision examination performed by a state licensed optometrist, ophthalmologist, physician, or doctor of osteopathy. The examination, or a copy of a prior examination if the child has previously received a vision examination under this section, shall be submitted to the school no later than January first of the first year in which the student is enrolled at the school.

2. The state board of education, in conjunction with the 9 10 department of health and senior services, shall promulgate rules establishing the criteria for meeting the requirements of subsection 1 of 11 this section, which may include, but are not limited to, forms or other 12proof of such examination, or other rules as are necessary for the 1314 enforcement of this section. The form or other proof of such 15examination shall include but not be limited to identifying the result of 16 the examinations performed under subsection 4 of this section, the cost for the examination, the examiner's qualifications, and method of 17payment through either: 18

19 (1) Insurance;

20 (2) The state Medicaid program;

21 (3) Personal injury;

- 22 (4) Complimentary; or
- 23 (5) Other form of payment.

3. The department of elementary and secondary education, in 2425conjunction with the department of health and senior services, shall compile and maintain a list of sources to which children who may need 26vision examinations or children who have been found to need further 27examination or vision correction may be referred for treatment on a free 2829or reduced cost basis. The sources may include individuals, and federal, 30state, local government, and private programs. The department of 31elementary and secondary education shall ensure that the 32superintendent of schools, the principal of each elementary school, the 33 school nurse or other person responsible for school health services, and the parent organization for each district elementary school receives an 34updated copy of the list each year prior to school opening. Professional 35and service organizations concerned with vision health may assist in 36 37gathering and disseminating the information, at the direction of the department of elementary and secondary education. 38

4. For purposes of this section, the following comprehensive
vision examinations shall be performed:

- 41 (1) Complete case history;
- 42 (2) Visual acuity at distance:
- 43 (a) Unaided (mono plus binocular);
- 44 (b) Last prescription or habitual prescription (mono plus45 binocular);
- 46 (3) External examination, including pupil reactivity;
- 47 (4) Internal examination (ophthalmoscopic examination);
- 48 (5) Retinoscopy;
- 49 (6) Refractive status:
- 50 (a) Subjective refraction to best visual acuity at distance;
- 51 (b) Subjective refraction at near;
- 52 (7) Measurement of binocularity, including vengences, phoric, and
- 53 accommodative ability;
- 54 (8) Color vision screening;
- 55 (9) Glaucoma screening, including tonometry.

565. Findings from the examination shall be kept by the optometrist, 57ophthalmologist, physician, or doctor of osteopathy for a period of six 58vears.

596. For purposes of this section, the office of any optometrist, ophthalmologist, physician, or doctor of osteopathy conducting a 60 comprehensive vision examination shall contain, in good working 6162 condition, the following minimum equipment:

(1) Ophthalmoscope;

- 64 (2) Retinoscope or its equivalent;
- 65 (3) Tonometer;
- 66 (4) Visual Field Testing Device;
- (5) Color Vision Testing Device; 67
- 68 (6) Keratometer or its equivalent;
- 69 (7) Biomicroscope;
- 70(8) Lenses for subjective testing;
- 71(9) Blood pressure measuring device.

In the event that a parent or legal guardian of a child subject to this section shall submit to the appropriate school administrator a 7374written request that the child be excused from taking a vision examination as provided in this section on the grounds of religious 7576beliefs, that child shall be so excused.

8. Pursuant to section 23.253, RSMo, of the Missouri sunset act:

78(1) The provisions of the new program authorized under this section shall automatically sunset four years after the effective date of 79 80 this section unless reauthorized by an act of the general assembly; and (2) If such program is reauthorized, the program authorized 81 82 under this section shall automatically sunset eight years after the effective date of the reauthorization of this section; and 83

(3) This section shall terminate on September first of the calendar 85 year immediately following the calendar year in which the program 86 authorized under this section is sunset.

192.935. 1. There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Blindness $\mathbf{2}$ Education, Screening and Treatment Program Fund". The fund shall consist of moneys donated pursuant to subsection 7 of section 301.020, RSMo, and 3 subsection 3 of section 302.171, RSMo. Unexpended balances in the fund at the 4 end of any fiscal year shall not be transferred to the general revenue fund or any 5other fund, the provisions of section 33.080, RSMo, to the contrary 6

7 notwithstanding.

8 2. Subject to the availability of funds in the blindness education, screening 9 and treatment program fund, the department shall develop a blindness education, 10 screening and treatment program to provide blindness prevention education and 11 to provide screening and treatment for persons who do not have adequate 12 coverage for such services under a health benefit plan.

13 3. The program shall provide for:

14 (1) Public education about blindness and other eye conditions;

15 (2) Screenings and eye examinations to identify conditions that may cause16 blindness; [and]

17 (3) Treatment procedures necessary to prevent blindness;

(4) Any additional costs for vision examinations under section 1819167.195, RSMo, that are not covered by existing public health 20insurance. Subject to appropriations, moneys from the fund shall be 21used to pay for those additional costs, provided that the costs do not 22exceed ninety-nine thousand dollars per year. Payment from the fund 23for vision examinations under section 167.195, RSMo, shall not exceed the allowable state Medicaid reimbursement amount for vision 2425examinations.

4. The department may contract for program development with any
department-approved nonprofit organization dealing with regional and community
blindness education, eye donor and vision treatment services.

5. The department may adopt rules to prescribe eligibility requirementsfor the program.

6. No rule or portion of a rule promulgated pursuant to the authority of
this section shall become effective unless it has been promulgated pursuant to the
provisions of chapter 536, RSMo.
