AN ACT

To repeal section 290.505, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to overtime for public employees, with an emergency clause.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 290.505, RSMo, is repealed and one new section 2 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 290.505, to read as follows:

290.505. 1. No employer shall employ any of his employees for a workweek longer than forty hours unless such employee receives compensation for his employment in excess of the hours above specified at a rate not less than one and one-half times the regular rate at which he is employed.

5 2. Employees of an amusement or recreation business that meets the 6 criteria set out in 29 U.S.C. § 213(a) (3) must be paid one and one-half times their 7 regular compensation for any hours worked in excess of fifty-two hours in any 8 one-week period.

9 3. With the exception of employees described in subsection (2), the 10 overtime requirements of subsection (1) shall not apply to employees who are exempt from federal minimum wage or overtime requirements pursuant to 29 11 12U.S.C. §§ 213(a)-(b) or to public agency employees who are engaged in fire protection, emergency medical services, or law enforcement activities 13in an alternative work period as provided for in 29 U.S.C. § 207(k). This 1415subsection is not intended to in any way change partial or complete exemptions provided under the Fair Labor Standards Act. 16

Section B. Because of the need to preserve federal standards relating to overtime payments to employees, section A of this act is deemed necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, welfare, peace and safety, and is hereby declared to be an emergency act within the meaning of the constitution, 5 and section A of this act shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and
