

# 2012 Survey Results

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#### 2012 SURVEY SUMMARY

The results of my 2012 legislative survey show that constituents in the 14th Senatorial District are well versed in what is going on in state government. The following data was submitted to my office through a series of questions regarding many controversial topics such as economic development, senior citizen and veterans care, statewide smoking bans, county debt, and many other topics. Hundreds of people participated in the survey, and I value everyone's opinion. The information my office collected guides many of my legislative priorities this year and helpS me craft many of my sponsored and co-sponsored bills.


In the area of economic development, citizens who participated in my legislative survey state that our state's tax credit system must be reformed. They also indicate that St. Louis County officials should disclose their debts to the public. Survey takers spoke out against converting portions of I-70 into a toll road and rejected the idea of allowing charter schools to be operated in any Missouri school district that is provisionally accredited or unaccredited. Survey takers also overwhelmingly support mandatory reporting of child sexual abuse cases and the institution of more nutritional, locally grown food items in schools.

In the area of medical facility "certificate of need" policy requirements 42% of survey takers say we must revise requirements for specific facilities, such as long-term health care, and 18% say we should let the market self-regulate the issue. I also asked survey takers to rank which senior and veteran issues were most important. The No. 1 issue was making sure we fund seniors' ability to stay in their homes, followed by funding assisted living centers and nursing homes. Survey takers also overwhelmingly agreed that we should have tougher penalties for those who abuse seniors and that we should help seniors who have claimed or are close to bankruptcy.








#### MARIJUANA POSSESSION:

Should Missouri reduce the penalties for marijuana possession?




#### TOLL ROADS:

Should Missouri convert portions of Interstate 70 into a toll road?








Should all citizens be required to report suspected sexual abuse of children to law enforcement?


Do you think Missouri schools and institutions need help incorporating more nutritional, locally grown items in their food plans?



# LEGISLATIVE TERM LIMITS: Should Missouri eliminate term limits for legislators?

In Missouri's General Assembly, legislators, with some exceptions for partial terms, can serve for a total of 16 years, but no more than eight years each in the House or Senate. Legislative term limits took full effect with the 2002 elections.

Critics of term limits say the rapid turnover caused by term limits have resulted in inexperienced lawmakers who lack institutional knowledge and expertise on complex issues and has shifted powers from the Legislature to the executive branch and special interest lobbyists. Supporters say legislative term limits ensure that Missourians are being represented by people with fresh ideas.



# MEDICAL FACILITY "CERTIFICATE OF NEED":

Missouri's "certificate of need" policy requirements regulate the construction and expansion of medical facilities. The purpose of Certificate of Need laws is to eliminate duplication of services and reduce overall costs. In recent years, some have proposed eliminating the certificate of need requirements.

Proponents argue it would increase competition and ultimately drive down health care costs. They also contend the process of obtaining a certificate of need is costly, time consuming and stifles the free market.

Opponents of elimination believe the current requirements ensure quality services are provided in a given region while avoiding unnecessary and duplicative medical facilities that drive up health care costs. They also contend eliminating the requirements would result in the building of specialty hospitals that provide only the most profitable services. They argue that such cherry-picking of services would give specialty facilities an unfair advantage over general hospitals that must offer a full range of services, including caring for the uninsured.



## Bankruptcy Protection for Seniors:


Seniors are currently subject to the same limits in equity as all Missourians when filing for bankruptcy. Missouri law allows individuals filing for bankruptcy to exempt a homestead up to \$15,000 in value. Some in Missouri have proposed changing Missouri law to reflect the federal limit for homestead equity, which is currently \$125,000.


## **Senior Abuse:**

Should Missouri create tougher penalties for individuals who physically or emotionally abuse individuals 60 years old or older?




