Amend SS/SCS/Senate Bill Nos. 411 & 230, Page 1, Section TITLE, Line 7,

by striking the word "nontraditional"; and 2 3 Further amend said bill and page, Section A, line 7, by inserting after all of said line the following: 4 "160.011. As used in chapters 160, 161, 162, 163, 164, 5 165, 167, 168, 170, 171, 177 and 178, the following terms 6 7 mean: 8 (1) "District" or "school district", when used alone, 9 may include seven-director, urban, and metropolitan school districts: 10 (2) "Elementary school", a public school giving 11 instruction in a grade or grades not higher than the eighth 12 13 grade; (3) "Family literacy programs", services of sufficient 14 15 intensity in terms of hours, and of sufficient duration, to make sustainable changes in families that include: 16 Interactive literacy activities between parents 17 (a) and their children; 18 (b) Training of parents regarding how to be the 19 20 primary teacher of their children and full partners in the 21 education of their children; Parent literacy training that leads to high school 22 23 completion and economic self sufficiency; and 24 (d) An age-appropriate education to prepare children 25 of all ages for success in school;

- 26 (4)"Graduation rate", the quotient of the number of 27 graduates in the current year as of June thirtieth divided 28 by the sum of the number of graduates in the current year as of June thirtieth plus the number of twelfth graders who 29 dropped out in the current year plus the number of eleventh 30 31 graders who dropped out in the preceding year plus the 32 number of tenth graders who dropped out in the second 33 preceding year plus the number of ninth graders who dropped 34 out in the third preceding year;
- (5) "High school", a public school giving instructionin a grade or grades not lower than the ninth nor higherthan the twelfth grade;
- 38 (6) "Metropolitan school district", any school
 39 district the boundaries of which are coterminous with the
 40 limits of any city which is not within a county;
- 41 (7) "Public school" includes all elementary and high 42 schools operated at public expense;
- 43 (8) "School board", the board of education having 44 general control of the property and affairs of any school 45 district;
- (9) "School term", a minimum of one hundred seventy-46 47 four school days, as that term is defined in section 160.041, for schools with a five-day school week or a 48 49 minimum of one hundred forty-two school days, as that term is defined in section 160.041, for schools with a four-day 50 school week, and one thousand forty-four hours of actual 51 52 pupil attendance as scheduled by the board pursuant to section 171.031 during a twelve-month period in which the 53 academic instruction of pupils is actually and regularly 54 carried on for a group of students in the public schools of 55 any school district. In any school district located wholly 56 or partially in a county with a charter form of government 57 58 or a city with at least thirty thousand inhabitants, the

- 59 minimum school term shall be one hundred seventy-four school
- 60 days and one thousand forty-four hours of actual pupil
- 61 attendance, unless such school district adopts a four-day
- 62 school week pursuant to the provisions of section 171.028.
- 63 In school year 2019-20 and subsequent years, for schools
- 64 with a four-day school week, one thousand forty-four hours
- of actual pupil attendance shall be required with no minimum
- 66 number of school days required. A school term may be within
- 67 a school year or may consist of parts of two consecutive
- 68 school years, but does not include summer school. A
- 69 district may choose to operate two or more terms for
- 70 different groups of children. A school term for students
- 71 participating in a school flex program as established in
- 72 section 160.539 may consist of a combination of actual pupil
- 73 attendance and attendance at college or technical career
- 74 education or approved employment aligned with the student's
- 75 career academic plan for a total of the required number of
- 76 hours as provided in this subdivision;
- 77 (10) "Secretary", the secretary of the board of a
- 78 school district;
- 79 (11) "Seven-director district", any school district
- 80 which has seven directors and includes urban districts
- 81 regardless of the number of directors an urban district may
- 82 have unless otherwise provided by law;
- 83 (12) "Taxpayer", any individual who has paid taxes to
- 84 the state or any subdivision thereof within the immediately
- 85 preceding twelve-month period or the spouse of such
- 86 individual;
- 87 (13) "Town", any town or village, whether or not
- 88 incorporated, the plat of which has been filed in the office
- 89 of the recorder of deeds of the county in which it is
- 90 situated;

- 91 "Urban school district", any district which 92 includes more than half of the population or land area of 93 any city which has not less than seventy thousand inhabitants, other than a city which is not within a county. 94 95 The "minimum school day" consists of 160.041. 1. 96 three hours for schools with a five-day school week or four hours for schools with a four-day school week in which the 97 98 pupils are under the quidance and direction of teachers in 99 the teaching process. A "school month" consists of four 100 weeks of five days each for schools with a five-day school 101 week or four weeks of four days each for schools with a four-102 day school week. In school year 2019-20 and subsequent 103 years, for schools with a four-day school week, no minimum 104 number of school days shall be required, and "school day" 105 shall mean any day in which, for any amount of time, pupils 106 are under the guidance and direction of teachers in the 107 teaching process. The "school year" commences on the first day of July and ends on the thirtieth day of June following. 108
- 2. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 1 of 109 this section, the commissioner of education is authorized to 110 reduce the required number of hours or days in which the 111 112 pupils are under the quidance and direction of teachers in 113 the teaching process if:
- 114 There is damage to or destruction of a public 115 school facility which requires the dual utilization of 116 another school facility; or
- Flooding or other inclement weather as defined in 117 subsection 1 of section 171.033 prevents students from 118 attending the public school facility. 119
- 120 Such reduction shall not extend beyond two calendar years in duration."; and

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          "171.028. 1. The school board of a school district
     that is located wholly or partially in a county with a
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     charter form of government or a city with more than thirty
     thousand inhabitants may establish a four-day school week in
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     lieu of a five-day school week only as permitted pursuant to
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     the provisions of this section.
          2. (1) A school board may adopt the provisions of
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     subsection 1 of this section by referring to the qualified
     voters of the school district a ballot measure authorizing
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     the same. Such proposal shall be referred to the qualified
     voters of the school district upon a majority vote of the
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     members elected to the school board. Upon such adoption by
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     the school board, the measure shall be submitted to the
     qualified voters at the next date available for public
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     elections pursuant to chapter 115 and by July first of the
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     school year in which the four-day school week is proposed to
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     commence. If a majority of the votes cast on the question
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     by the qualified voters voting thereon are in favor of the
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     measure, then the provisions of subsection 1 of this section
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     shall become effective. If a majority of the votes cast on
     the question by the qualified voters voting thereon are
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     opposed to the measure, then the board shall not adopt the
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     provisions of subsection 1 of this section unless and until
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     the measure is resubmitted pursuant to this subsection to
     the qualified voters and such question is approved by a
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     majority of the qualified voters voting on the measure.

158 (3) A school district may adopt a four-day school week for the 2023-24 school year only if such school district 159 160 adopted such school week prior to August 28, 2023. 161 (4) A school district may adopt a four-day school week for the 2024-25 school year only if such district adopted a 162 163 four-day school week for the 2023-24 school year and satisfies all the requirements of this subsection for the 164 165 2024-25 school year by July 1, 2024. 3. Upon adoption of a four-day school week, any school 166 district that adopts a four-day school week shall file a 167 168 calendar with the department of elementary and secondary education in accordance with section 171.031. Such calendar 169 170 shall include, but not be limited to, a minimum term of one 171 hundred forty-two school days, as the term "school days" is 172 defined in section 160.041, and one thousand forty-four 173 hours of actual pupil attendance hours during a twelve-month 174 period in which the academic instruction of pupils is 175 actually and regularly carried on for a group of students in 176 the public schools of any school district, pursuant to the provisions of section 171.031. 177 178 171.031. 1. Each school board shall prepare annually a calendar for the school term, specifying the opening date, 179 180 days of planned attendance, and providing a minimum term of 181 at least one hundred seventy-four days for schools with a five-day school week or one hundred forty-two days for 182 schools with a four-day school week, and one thousand forty-183 four hours of actual pupil attendance. In school year 2019-184 185 20 and subsequent years, for schools with a four-day school week, one thousand forty-four hours of actual pupil 186 attendance shall be required for the school term with no 187 188 minimum number of school days. In addition, such calendar

- shall include six make-up days for possible loss of
 attendance due to inclement weather as defined in subsection
 191 1 of section 171.033. In school year 2019-20 and subsequent
 192 years, such calendar shall include thirty-six make-up hours
 193 for possible loss of attendance due to inclement weather, as
 194 defined in subsection 1 of section 171.033, with no minimum
 195 number of make-up days.
- 196 Each local school district may set its opening date 197 each year, which date shall be no earlier than fourteen 198 calendar days prior to the first Monday in September. No 199 public school district shall select an earlier start date 200 unless, for calendars for school years before school year 201 2020-21, the district follows the procedure set forth in 202 subsection 3 of this section. The procedure set forth in 203 subsection 3 of this section shall be unavailable to school districts in preparing their calendars for school year 2020-204 205 21 and for subsequent years.
- 3. For calendars for school years before school year 206 207 2020-21, a district may set an opening date that is more than fourteen calendar days prior to the first Monday in 208 209 September only if the local school board first gives public notice of a public meeting to discuss the proposal of 210 opening school on a date more than fourteen days prior to 211 212 the first Monday in September, and the local school board 213 holds said meeting and, at the same public meeting, a 214 majority of the board votes to allow an earlier opening 215 date. If all of the previous conditions are met, the district may set its opening date more than fourteen 216 calendar days prior to the first Monday in September. 217 218 condition provided in this subsection must be satisfied by 219 the local school board each year that the board proposes an 220 opening date more than fourteen days before the first Monday 221 in September.

- 4. If any local district violates the provisions of this section, the department of elementary and secondary education shall withhold an amount equal to one quarter of the state funding the district generated under section 163.031 for each date the district was in violation of this section.
- 5. The provisions of subsections 2 to 4 of this section shall not apply to school districts in which school is in session for twelve months of each calendar year.
- 231 6. The state board of education may grant an exemption
 232 from this section to a school district that demonstrates
 233 highly unusual and extenuating circumstances justifying
 234 exemption from the provisions of subsections 2 to 4 of this
 235 section. Any exemption granted by the state board of
 236 education shall be valid for one academic year only."; and
