AN ACT

To amend chapter 334, RSMo, by adding thereto eight new sections relating to the regulation and licensing of the practice of naturopathic medicine.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 334, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto

- 2 eight new sections, to be known as sections 334.1051, 334.1053,
- 3 334.1056, 334.1059, 334.1062, 334.1065, 334.1068, and 334.1071,
- 4 to read as follows:
 - 334.1051. 1. As used in sections 334.1051 to
- 2 334.1071, the following terms shall mean:
- 3 (1) "Approved medical educational program", an
- 4 education program that the board has approved as meeting the
- 5 requirements of section 334.1059 and that prepares
- 6 naturopathic physicians for the practice of naturopathic
- 7 medicine;
- 8 (2) "Board", the state board of registration for the
- 9 healing arts;
- 10 (3) "Clinical laboratory procedure", the use of
- 11 venipuncture consistent with naturopathic medical practice;
- 12 commonly used diagnostic modalities consistent with
- 13 naturopathic practice; the recording of a patient's health
- 14 history; physical examination; and ordering and interpreting
- 15 radiographic diagnostics and other standard imaging and
- 16 examining body orifices, excluding endoscopy and colonoscopy;

17 (4) "Committee", the naturopathic physicians advisory
18 committee of the board established in section 334.1056;

- 19 (5) "Dangerous drugs", narcotics or controlled
- 20 substances described in chapter 195;
- 21 (6) "Homeopathic medicine", a system of medicine based
- 22 on the use of infinitesimal doses of substances capable of
- 23 producing symptoms similar to those of the disease treated,
- 24 as listed in the Homeopathic Pharmacopeia of the United
- 25 States;
- 26 (7) "Hygiene", the use of preventative techniques,
- 27 including, but not limited to, personal hygiene, asepsis,
- 28 public health, and safety;
- 29 (8) "Laboratory examination", phlebotomy, a clinical
- 30 laboratory procedure, an orifice examination, a
- 31 physiological function test, or a screening or test that is
- 32 consistent with naturopathic education and training;
- 33 (9) "Legend drug", the same meaning as in section
- 34 **338.330**;
- 35 (10) "Minor office procedure", minor surgical care and
- 36 procedures, including, but not limited to, the following:
- 37 (a) Surgical care incidental to superficial
- 38 laceration, lesion, or abrasion, excluding surgical care to
- 39 treat a lesion suspected of malignancy;
- 40 (b) The removal of foreign bodies located in
- 41 superficial structures, excluding the globe of the eye;
- 42 (c) Trigger point therapy;
- 43 (d) Dermal stimulation;
- (e) Allergy testing and treatment; and
- 45 (f) The use of antiseptics and topical or local
- 46 anesthetics;
- 47 (11) "NABNE", the North American Board of Naturopathic
- 48 Examiners;

- 49 (12) "Naturopathic medicine", includes the following:
- 50 (a) A system of health care for the prevention,
- diagnosis, and treatment of human health conditions, injury,
- 52 and disease;

- (b) The promotion or restoration of health; and
- 54 (c) The support and stimulation of a patient's
- 55 inherent self-healing processes through patient education
- and the use of naturopathic therapies and therapeutic
- 57 **substances**;
- 58 (13) "Naturopathic physical medicine", the use of one
- or more of the following physical agents in a manner
- 60 consistent with naturopathic medical practice on a part or
- 61 the whole of the body, by hand or by mechanical means, in
- 62 the resolution of a human ailment or condition: air, water,
- 63 heat, cold, sound, light, electromagnetism, colon
- 64 hydrotherapy, soft tissue therapy, joint mobilization,
- 65 therapeutic exercise, or naturopathic manipulation. The
- 66 term shall not include the practice of physical therapy,
- 67 acupuncture, or application of chiropractic adjustments and
- 68 the principles or techniques of chiropractic science;
- 69 (14) "Naturopathic therapy", the use of naturopathic
- 70 physical medicine, suggestion, hygiene, a therapeutic
- 71 substance, a dangerous drug, nutrition and food science,
- 72 homeopathic medicine, a clinical laboratory procedure, or a
- 73 minor office procedure;
- 74 (15) "Nutrition and food science", the prevention and
- 75 treatment of disease or other human conditions through the
- 76 use of food, water, herbs, roots, bark, or natural food
- 77 elements;
- 78 (16) "Professional examination", a competency-based
- 79 national naturopathic physician licensing examination
- 80 administered by NABNE, or its successor agency, which board

81 has been nationally recognized to administer a naturopathic

- 82 examination that represents federal standards of education
- 83 and training;
- 84 (17) "Suggestion", a technique using biofeedback,
- 85 hypnosis, health education, or health counseling;
- 86 (18) "Therapeutic substance", any of the following
- 87 exemplified in a standard naturopathic medical text,
- 88 journal, or pharmacopeia: a vitamin, mineral,
- 89 nutraceutical, botanical medicine, oxygen, homeopathic
- 90 medicine, hormone, hormonal or pharmaceutical contraceptive
- 91 device, or other physiological substance.
 - 334.1053. The board shall license an applicant who:
- 2 (1) Is of good moral character;
- 3 (2) Submits the following items to the board:
- 4 (a) An application for license;
- 5 (b) Evidence that the applicant has graduated from an
- 6 approved naturopathic medical educational program;
- 7 (c) Evidence that the applicant successfully completed
- 8 a competency-based national naturopathic medicine licensing
- 9 examination;
- (d) Evidence that the applicant has passed a pharmacy
- 11 examination authorized by the board and administered by
- 12 **NABNE**;
- (e) Evidence that the applicant has passed a state
- 14 jurisprudence examination that meets standards authorized by
- 15 the board;
- (f) Evidence of professional liability insurance with
- 17 policy limits not less than prescribed by the board in rule;
- 18 (q) Be at least twenty-one years of age;
- (h) Be a United States citizen or an alien lawfully
- 20 admitted for permanent residence in the United States; and

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21 (i) Pay all application and examination fees required 22 by the board;

- 23 (3) Is determined by the board, upon recommendation by 24 the committee, to be physically and mentally capable of
- 25 safely practicing naturopathic medicine with or without
- 26 reasonable accommodation; and
- 27 (4) Has not had a license to practice naturopathic
- 28 medicine or other health care license, registration, or
- 29 certification refused, revoked, or suspended by any other
- 30 jurisdiction for reasons that related to the applicant's
- 31 ability to skillfully and safely practice naturopathic
- 32 medicine, unless that license, registration, or
- 33 certification has been restored to good standing by the
- 34 jurisdiction.
 - 334.1056. 1. There is hereby established a
- 2 "Naturopathic Physicians Advisory Committee" for the purpose
- 3 of providing advice for the board regarding licensure of
- 4 naturopathic physicians and matters relating to the training
- 5 of naturopathic physicians.
- 6 2. The governor shall appoint, with the advice and
- 7 consent of the senate, an initial committee consisting of
- 8 one member for a term of four years and two members for
- 9 terms of three years each. As the terms of the initial
- 10 committee members expire, the board shall appoint successors
- 11 for terms of four years each. No more than two members
- 12 shall be affiliated with the same political party. All
- 13 members shall be citizens of the United States. The
- 14 committee shall consist of three voting members as follows:
- 15 (1) Two licensed naturopathic physicians, except that
- 16 the first such members shall become licensed within six
- months of August 28, 2023; and

- One member who is a resident of the state who is 18 (2) 19 not, and never has been, a licensed health care practitioner 20 and who does not have an interest in naturopathic education, 21 naturopathic medicine, or naturopathic business or practice.
- 22 At the first meeting of the committee, the members 23 shall elect a chair. The committee shall meet at least once during each calendar quarter. The committee may hold 24 25 additional meetings at the call of the chair or upon the 26 written request of any two members of the committee.
- 27 Each member shall receive compensation in an amount set by the commission not to exceed seventy dollars for each 28 29 day devoted to the duties of the commission, and shall be entitled to reimbursement for the member's expenses 30 31 necessarily incurred in the discharge of his or her official 32 duties.
- The committee shall develop guidelines for the 33 34 board to consider for rulemaking, including, but not limited 35 to:
- 36 Regulating the licensure of naturopathic physicians and determining the hours of continuing education 37 units required for maintaining licensure as a naturopathic 38 39 physician;
- Prescribing the manner in which records of 41 examinations and treatments shall be kept and maintained;
- 42 Establishing standards for professional 43 responsibility and conduct;

- Identifying disciplinary actions and circumstances 44 (4)that require disciplinary action; 45
- 46 Developing a means to provide information to all 47 licensees in the state;

- 48 (6) Providing for the investigation of complaints 49 against licensees or persons holding themselves out as 50 naturopathic physicians in the state;
- 51 (7) Providing for the publication of information for 52 the public about licensees and the practice of naturopathic 53 medicine in the state;
- 54 (8) Providing for an orderly process for reinstatement 55 of a license; and
- 56 (9) Establishing criteria for advertising or 57 promotional materials.
- 334.1059. 1. The board shall, in collaboration with
 the committee, establish guidelines for an approved
 naturopathic medical educational program and examination for
 an applicant for licensure, which shall, at a minimum, meet
 the following requirements:
 - (1) Graduation from:

- A naturopathic medical education program in the 7 8 United States providing the degree of doctor of naturopathy 9 or doctor of naturopathic medicine, which shall offer 10 graduate-level, full-time didactic and supervised clinical training and shall be accredited or have achieved candidacy 11 status for accreditation by the Council on Naturopathic 12 Medical Education (CNME), or an equivalent federally-13 14 recognized accrediting body for naturopathic medical programs, and which shall be an institution of higher 15 education or part of an institution of higher education that 16 is either accredited or is a candidate for accreditation by 17 a regional or national institutional accrediting agency 18 19 recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education;
- 20 (b) A degree-granting institution of higher education 21 in the United States that, prior to the existence of the 22 CNME, offered a full-time, structured curriculum in basic

23 science and supervised patient care comprising a doctoral

24 naturopathic medical education requiring not less than one

- 25 hundred thirty-two weeks of coursework to be completed
- 26 within a period of not less than thirty-five months, which
- 27 was reputable and in good standing in the judgment of the
- 28 board and which, if still in existence, has current
- 29 programmatic accreditation by the CNME or a federally-
- 30 recognized equivalent accrediting agency;
- 31 (c) A diploma-granting, degree-equivalent institution
- of higher education located in Canada that, prior to the
- 33 existence of the CNME, had provincial approval for
- 34 participation in government-funded student aid programs,
- offered a full-time, structured curriculum in basic science
- 36 and supervised patient care comprising a doctoral
- 37 naturopathic medical education requiring not less than one
- 38 hundred thirty-two weeks of coursework to be completed
- 39 within a period of not less than thirty months, which was
- 40 reputable and in good standing in the judgment of the board
- 41 and which, if still in existence, has current programmatic
- 42 accreditation by the CNME or a federally-recognized
- 43 equivalent accrediting agency, and has provincial approval
- 44 for participation in government-funded student aid programs;
- 45 **or**
- 46 (d) A diploma-granting, degree-equivalent institution
- 47 of higher education located in Canada that has provincial
- 48 approval for participation in government-funded student aid
- 49 programs, offers graduate-level, full-time didactic and
- 50 supervised clinical training and is accredited or has
- 51 achieved candidacy status for accreditation by the CNME, or
- 52 an equivalent federally-recognized accrediting body for
- 53 naturopathic medical programs; and

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- 54 (2) Successful completion of a competency-based 55 national naturopathic medicine licensing examination 56 administered by the NABNE, or an equivalent agency recognized by the board, or, for graduates of approved 57 58 naturopathic medical programs in the United States prior to 59 the existence of the CNME, a competency-based state naturopathic medicine licensing examination for the practice 60 61 of naturopathic medicine approved by the board. 334.1062. 1. A licensee may practice naturopathic 2 medicine to provide primary care in alignment with 3 naturopathic medical education in the following ways: To perform physical examinations; 4 (1) 5 (2) To order laboratory examinations; (3) To order diagnostic imaging studies; 6 7 (4) To interpret the results of laboratory examinations for diagnostic purposes; 8 9 (5) To order and, based on a radiologist's report, 10 take action on diagnostic imaging studies in a manner 11 consistent with naturopathic training; To prescribe, administer, dispense, and order 12 (6) food, extracts of food, nutraceuticals, vitamins, amino 13 acids, minerals, enzymes, botanicals and their extracts, 14 15 botanical medicine, homeopathic medicines, and dietary 16 supplements and nonprescription drugs; 17 To prescribe, administer, dispense, and order all (7) legend drugs and all Schedule III, IV, and V controlled 18 substances described in section 195.017; 19 To administer intramuscular, intravenous, 20 subcutaneous, intra-articular, and intradermal injections of 21 22 substances appropriate to naturopathic medicine; 23 To use routes of administration that include oral,
- nasal, auricular, ocular, rectal, vaginal, transdermal,

- 25 intradermal, subcutaneous, intravenous, intra-articular, and
- 26 intramuscular, consistent with the education and training of
- 27 a naturopathic physician;
- 28 (10) To perform naturopathic physical medicine;
- 29 (11) To employ the use of naturopathic therapy;
- 30 (12) To use therapeutic devices, barrier
- 31 contraception, intrauterine devices, hormonal and
- 32 pharmaceutical contraception and durable medical equipment;
- 33 and
- 34 (13) To perform minor office procedures.
- 35 2. A licensee shall refer to a physician licensed
- 36 under this chapter any patient whose medical condition
- 37 should, at the time of evaluation or treatment, be
- 38 determined to be beyond the scope of practice of the
- 39 licensee.
- 40 3. A licensee shall not:
- 41 (1) Perform surgery outside of the scope of minor
- 42 office procedures permitted in the employment of
- 43 naturopathic therapy;
- 44 (2) Use general or spinal anesthetics;
- 45 (3) Administer ionizing radioactive substances for
- 46 therapeutic purposes;
- 47 (4) Perform a surgical procedure using a laser device;
- 48 (5) Perform a surgical procedure involving any of the
- 49 following areas of the body that extend beyond superficial
- 50 tissue: eye, ear, tendon, nerves, veins, or artery;
- 51 (6) Perform an abortion, as such term is defined in
- 52 **section 188.015**;
- 53 (7) Treat any lesion suspected of malignancy or
- 54 requiring surgical removal; or
- 55 (8) Perform acupuncture.

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4. A licensee shall display the licensee's license in the licensee's place of business in a location clearly visible to the licensee's patients and shall also display evidence of the licensee having completed an approved naturopathic medical education program.

5. A licensee has the exclusive right to use the following terms in reference to the licensee's self:
"naturopathic physician", "naturopathic doctor", "doctor of naturopathic medicine", "doctor of naturopathy", "N.D.", and "ND". An individual shall not represent himself or herself to the public as a naturopathic physician, naturopathic doctor, a doctor of naturopathic medicine, or a doctor of naturopathy, or as being otherwise authorized to practice naturopathic medicine in the state, unless he or she is a licensee.

334.1065. The provisions of sections 334.1051 to 334.1071 shall not apply to the following persons:

- (1) A health care professional who is licensed, certified, or registered under the laws of this state and who is performing services within his or her authorized scope of practice;
- 7 (2) A student enrolled in an approved naturopathic 8 medical educational program; provided, that the practice of 9 naturopathic medicine by the student is performed pursuant 10 to a course of instruction or an assignment from an 11 instructor and under the supervision of the instructor who 12 is a licensee or a duly-licensed professional in the 13 instructed field;
- 14 (3) Any person selling a vitamin or herb who provides 15 information about the vitamin or herb;
- 16 (4) A person licensed to practice naturopathic
 17 medicine in any other state or district in the United States

- 18 and who entered this state to consult with a naturopathic
- 19 physician of this state; provided, that the consultation is
- 20 limited to examination, recommendation, or testimony in
- 21 litigation; or
- 22 (5) Any person or practitioner who is not licensed as
- 23 a naturopathic physician and who recommends the use of
- 24 ayurvedic medicine, herbal remedies, nutritional advice,
- 25 homeopathy, or other therapy that is within the scope of
- 26 practice of naturopathic medicine; provided, that the person
- 27 shall not recommend or provide a homeopathic medicine, a
- 28 hormone, a hormonal or pharmaceutical contraceptive device,
- 29 or any other physiologic substance.
 - 334.1068. 1. A license issued or renewed under
- 2 sections 334.1051 to 334.1071 shall expire two years
- 3 following its issuance or renewal. The board may renew the
- 4 license of any licensee who, upon the expiration of his or
- 5 her license:
- 6 (1) Has submitted an application for renewal;
- 7 (2) Has paid the renewal fee established by rules of
- 8 the board;
- 9 (3) Meets the qualifications for licensure set forth
- in the sections 334.1051 to 334.1071 and rules promulgated
- 11 thereunder; and
- 12 (4) Meets the continuing education requirements
- 13 established by the board.
- 14 2. The board may refuse to issue or renew a license
- 15 for failure to meet the requirements of sections 334.1051 to
- 16 334.1071, or the rules promulgated thereunder. The board
- 17 shall notify the applicant in writing of the reasons for
- 18 refusal and shall advise the applicant of his or her right
- 19 to file a complaint with the administrative hearing
- 20 commission as provided by chapter 621.

The board shall promulgate rules and 334.1071. regulations to implement the provisions of sections 334.1051 2 to 334.1071. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is 3 defined in section 536.010, that is created under the 4 5 authority delegated in sections 334.1051 to 334.1071 shall 6 become effective only if it complies with and is subject to 7 all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, 8 section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are 9 nonseverable and if any of the powers vested with the 10 general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are 11 subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of 12 rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after 13

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August 28, 2023, shall be invalid and void.
