AN ACT

To repeal sections 115.127, 115.205, 115.284, 115.427, 115.430, and 115.637, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof seven new sections relating to elections, with a penalty provision.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 115.127, 115.205, 115.284, 115.427,

- 2 115.430, and 115.637, RSMo, are repealed and seven new sections
- 3 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 115.127,
- 4 115.205, 115.284, 115.427, 115.430, 115.637, and 115.638, to
- 5 read as follows:
 - 115.127. 1. Except as provided in subsection 4 of
- 2 this section, upon receipt of notice of a special election
- 3 to fill a vacancy submitted pursuant to subsection 2 of
- 4 section 115.125, the election authority shall cause legal
- 5 notice of the special election to be published in a
- 6 newspaper of general circulation in its jurisdiction. The
- 7 notice shall include the name of the officer or agency
- 8 calling the election, the date and time of the election, the
- 9 name of the office to be filled and the date by which
- 10 candidates must be selected or filed for the office. Within
- 11 one week prior to each special election to fill a vacancy
- 12 held in its jurisdiction, the election authority shall cause
- 13 legal notice of the election to be published in two
- 14 newspapers of different political faith and general
- 15 circulation in the jurisdiction. The legal notice shall
- 16 include the date and time of the election, the name of the

- 17 officer or agency calling the election and a sample ballot.
- 18 If there is only one newspaper of general circulation in the
- 19 jurisdiction, the notice shall be published in the newspaper
- 20 within one week prior to the election. If there are two or
- 21 more newspapers of general circulation in the jurisdiction,
- 22 but no two of opposite political faith, the notice shall be
- 23 published in any two of the newspapers within one week prior
- 24 to the election.
- 25 2. Except as provided in subsections 1 and 4 of this
- 26 section and in sections 115.521, 115.549 and 115.593, the
- 27 election authority shall cause legal notice of each election
- 28 held in its jurisdiction to be published. The notice shall
- 29 be published in two newspapers of different political faith
- 30 and qualified pursuant to chapter 493 which are published
- 31 within the bounds of the area holding the election. If
- 32 there is only one so-qualified newspaper, then notice shall
- 33 be published in only one newspaper. If there is no
- 34 newspaper published within the bounds of the election area,
- 35 then the notice shall be published in two qualified
- 36 newspapers of different political faith serving the area.
- 37 Notice shall be published twice, the first publication
- 38 occurring in the second week prior to the election, and the
- 39 second publication occurring within one week prior to the
- 40 election. Each such legal notice shall include the date and
- 41 time of the election, the name of the officer or agency
- 42 calling the election and a sample ballot; and, unless notice
- 43 has been given as provided by section 115.129, the second
- 44 publication of notice of the election shall include the
- 45 location of polling places. The election authority may
- 46 provide any additional notice of the election it deems
- 47 desirable.

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48 The election authority shall print the official ballot as the same appears on the sample ballot, and no 49 50 candidate's name or ballot issue which appears on the sample ballot or official printed ballot shall be stricken or 51 52 removed from the ballot except on death of a candidate or by court order, but in no event shall a candidate or issue be 53 54 stricken or removed from the ballot less than eight weeks 55 before the date of the election.

- 4. In lieu of causing legal notice to be published in accordance with any of the provisions of this chapter, the election authority in jurisdictions which have less than seven hundred fifty registered voters and in which no newspaper qualified pursuant to chapter 493 is published, may cause legal notice to be mailed during the second week prior to the election, by first class mail, to each registered voter at the voter's voting address. All such legal notices shall include the date and time of the election, the location of the polling place, the name of the officer or agency calling the election and a sample ballot.
- 5. If the opening date for filing a declaration of 67 candidacy for any office in a political subdivision or 68 special district is not required by law or charter, the 69 70 opening filing date shall be 8:00 a.m., the seventeenth 71 Tuesday prior to the election. If the closing date for 72 filing a declaration of candidacy for any office in a 73 political subdivision or special district is not required by law or charter, the closing filing date shall be 5:00 p.m., 74 the fourteenth Tuesday prior to the election or, if the 75 fourteenth Tuesday prior to the election is a holiday, the 76 77 closing filing date shall be 5:00 p.m., on the next day that 78 is not a holiday. The political subdivision or special district calling an election shall, before the seventeenth 79

80 Tuesday, prior to any election at which offices are to be

- 81 filled, notify the general public of the opening filing
- 82 date, the office or offices to be filled, the proper place
- 83 for filing and the closing filing date of the election.
- 84 Such notification may be accomplished by legal notice
- 85 published in at least one newspaper of general circulation
- 86 in the political subdivision or special district.
- 87 6. Except as provided for in sections 115.247 and
- 88 115.359, if there is no additional cost for the printing or
- 89 reprinting of ballots or if the candidate agrees to pay any
- 90 printing or reprinting costs, a candidate who has filed for
- 91 an office or who has been duly nominated for an office may,
- 92 at any time after the certification of the notice of
- 93 election required in subsection 1 of section 115.125 but no
- 94 later than 5:00 p.m. on the eighth Tuesday before the
- 95 election, withdraw as a candidate pursuant to a court order,
- 96 which, except for good cause shown by the election authority
- 97 in opposition thereto, shall be freely given upon
- 98 application by the candidate to the circuit court of the
- 99 area of such candidate's residence.
 - 115.205. 1. No person shall be paid or otherwise
 - 2 compensated for soliciting voter registration applications,
 - 3 other than a governmental entity or a person who is paid or
 - 4 compensated by a governmental entity for such solicitation.
 - 5 A voter registration solicitor, other than a governmental
 - 6 entity or a person who is paid or compensated by a
 - 7 governmental entity for such solicitation, who solicits more
- 8 than ten voter registration applications shall register for
- 9 every election cycle that begins on the day after the
- 10 general election and ends on the day of the general election
- 11 two years later. A voter registration solicitor shall be at

12 least eighteen years of age and shall be a registered voter

- in the state of Missouri.
- 14 2. Each voter registration solicitor shall provide the
- 15 following information in writing to the secretary of state's
- 16 office:
- 17 (1) The name of the voter registration solicitor;
- 18 (2) The residential address, including street number,
- 19 city, state, and zip code;
- 20 (3) The mailing address, if different from the
- 21 residential address; and
- 22 (4) The signature of the voter registration solicitor.
- 3. The solicitor information required in subsection 2
- of this section shall be submitted to the secretary of
- 25 state's office with the following oath and affirmation:
- 26 "I HEREBY SWEAR OR AFFIRM UNDER PENALTY OF
- 27 PERJURY THAT ALL STATEMENTS MADE BY ME ARE TRUE
- 28 AND CORRECT.".
- 29 4. Any voter registration solicitor who knowingly
- 30 fails to register with the secretary of state is quilty of a
- 31 class three election offense. Voter registration
- 32 applications shall be accepted by the election authority if
- 33 such applications are otherwise valid, even if the voter
- 34 registration solicitor who procured the applications fails
- 35 to register with or submits false information to the
- 36 secretary of state.
 - 115.284. 1. There is hereby established an absentee
- 2 voting process to assist persons with permanent disabilities
- 3 in the exercise of their voting rights.
- 4 2. The local election authority shall send an
- 5 application to participate in the absentee voting process
- 6 set out in this section to any registered voter residing
- 7 within the election authority's jurisdiction upon request.

8 3. Upon receipt of a properly completed application, 9 the election authority shall enter the voter's name on a list of voters qualified to participate as absentee voters 10 pursuant to this section. 11 The application to participate in the absentee 12 voting process shall be in substantially the following form: 13 State of 14 County (City) of 15 I, (print applicant's name), declare 16 that I am a resident and registered voter of 17 County, Missouri, and am permanently 18 19 disabled. I hereby request that my name be placed on the election authority's list of voters 20 qualified to participate as absentee voters 21 pursuant to section 115.284, and that I be 22 delivered an absentee ballot application for each 23 election in which I am eligible to vote. 24 25 26 Signature of Voter 27 28 Voter's Address 29 30 5. Not earlier than ten weeks before an election but prior to the fourth Tuesday prior to an election, the 31 32 election authority shall deliver to each voter qualified to participate as absentee voters pursuant to this section an 33 absentee ballot application if the voter is eliqible to vote 34 in that election. If the voter returns the absentee request 35 application to the election authority not later than 5:00 36 p.m. on the second Wednesday before an election and has 37

retained the necessary qualifications to vote, the election

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39 authority shall provide the voter with an absentee ballot 40 pursuant to this chapter.

- 41 6. The election authority shall remove from the list
- 42 of voters qualified to participate as absentee voters
- 43 pursuant to this section any voter who:
- 44 (1) Asks to be removed from the list;
- 45 (2) Dies;
- 46 (3) Becomes disqualified from voting pursuant to this
- 47 chapter; or
- 48 (4) No longer resides at the address of his or her
- 49 voter registration.
- 7. All lists of applications under this section shall
- 51 be kept confidential to the extent that such lists of
- 52 applications shall not be posted or displayed in any area
- open to the general public, nor shall such lists of
- 54 applications be shown to any person who is not entitled to
- 55 see such lists of applications, pursuant to any other
- 56 provisions of law.
 - 115.427. 1. Persons seeking to vote in a public
- 2 election shall establish their identity and eligibility to
- 3 vote at the polling place or, if voting absentee in person
- 4 under section 115.277, at the office of the election
- 5 authority or other authorized location designated by the
- 6 election authority by presenting a form of personal photo
- 7 identification to election officials. No form of personal
- 8 photo identification other than the forms listed in this
- 9 section shall be accepted to establish a voter's
- 10 qualifications to vote. Forms of personal photo
- 11 identification that satisfy the requirements of this section
- 12 are any one of the following:
- 13 (1) Nonexpired Missouri driver's license;

14 (2) Nonexpired or nonexpiring Missouri nondriver's

- 15 license;
- 16 (3) A document that satisfies all of the following
- 17 requirements:
- 18 (a) The document contains the name of the individual
- 19 to whom the document was issued, and the name substantially
- 20 conforms to the most recent signature in the individual's
- 21 voter registration record;
- 22 (b) The document shows a photograph of the individual;
- 23 (c) The document includes an expiration date, and the
- 24 document is not expired, or, if expired, the document
- 25 expired after the date of the most recent general election;
- **26** and
- 27 (d) The document was issued by the United States or
- 28 the state of Missouri; or
- 29 (4) Any identification containing a photograph of the
- 30 individual which is issued by the Missouri National Guard,
- 31 the United States Armed Forces, including the Space Force,
- 32 or the United States Department of Veteran Affairs to a
- 33 member or former member of the Missouri National Guard or
- 34 the United States Armed Forces, including the Space Force,
- 35 and that is not expired or does not have an expiration date.
- 36 2. (1) An individual who appears at a polling place
- 37 without a form of personal identification described in
- 38 subsection 1 of this section and who is otherwise qualified
- 39 to vote at that polling place shall be allowed to cast a
- 40 provisional ballot. The election judges shall make a
- 41 notation on the provisional ballot envelope to indicate that
- 42 the voter's identity was not verified.
- 43 (2) For an individual requesting an absentee ballot in
- 44 person, such individual shall be entitled to cast a
- 45 provisional ballot if the individual appears to vote without

- 48 (3) No person shall be entitled to receive a
 49 provisional ballot until such person has completed a
 50 provisional ballot affidavit on the provisional ballot
 51 envelope. All provisional ballots shall be marked with a
 52 conspicuous stamp or mark that makes them distinguishable
- 54 [(3)] (4) The provisional ballot envelope shall be 55 completed by the voter for use in determining the voter's 56 eligibility to cast a ballot.
- 3. The provisional ballot envelope shall provide a
 place for the voter's name, address, date of birth, and last
 four digits of his or her Social Security number, followed
 by a certificate in substantially the following form:
- I do solemnly swear that I am the person identified above and the information provided is correct. I understand that my vote will not be counted unless:
- 65 (1) (a) I return to this polling place today 66 between 6:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. and provide one of 67 the following forms of identification:
- a. Nonexpired Missouri driver's license;
- 69 b. Nonexpired or nonexpiring Missouri nondriver's
 70 license;
- 71 c. A document that satisfies all of the following 72 requirements:
- (i) The document contains my name, in
 substantially the same form as the most recent
 signature on my voter registration record;
- 76 (ii) The document contains my photograph;
- 77 (iii) The document contains an expiration date 78 and is not expired, or if expired, the document

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79 expired after the date of the most recent general 80 election; and 81 The document was issued by the United States 82 or the state of Missouri; or 83 Identification containing my photograph issued to me by the Missouri National Guard, the United 84 85 States Armed Forces, including Space Force, or the United States Department of Veteran Affairs as a 86 member or former member of the Missouri National 87 Guard or the United States Armed Forces that is 88 89 not expired or does not have an expiration date; 90 or The election authority verifies my identity 91 (b) by comparing my signature on this envelope to the 92 93 signature on file with the election authority and determines that I was eligible to cast a ballot at 94 95 this polling place; and 96 This provisional ballot otherwise qualifies to be counted under the laws of the State of 97 98 Missouri. 99 Signature of Voter 100 Date 101

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Once voted, the provisional ballot shall be sealed in the provisional ballot envelope and placed in a separate secured container by the election judge.

Signature of Election Officials

- 4. The provisional ballot cast by such voter shall not be counted unless:
- 108 (1) (a) The voter returns to the polling place during 109 the uniform polling hours established by section 115.407 and 110 provides a form of personal identification that allows the

111 election judges to verify the voter's identity as provided

- in subsection 1 of this section; or
- 113 (b) The election authority verifies the identity of
- 114 the individual by comparing that individual's signature to
- 115 the signature on file with the election authority and
- 116 determines that the individual was eligible to cast a ballot
- 117 at the polling place where the ballot was cast; and
- 118 (2) The provisional ballot otherwise qualifies to be
- 119 counted under section 115.430.
- 120 5. The secretary of state shall provide notice of the
- 121 personal photo identification requirements described in
- 122 subsection 1 of this section on the official state internet
- 123 website of the secretary of state.
- 124 6. (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of section
- 136.055 and section 302.181 to the contrary, the state and
- 126 all fee offices shall provide one nondriver's license at no
- 127 cost to any otherwise qualified voter who does not already
- 128 possess such identification and who desires the
- 129 identification for voting.
- 130 (2) This state and its agencies shall provide one copy
- 131 of each of the following, free of charge, if needed by an
- 132 individual seeking to obtain a form of personal photo
- identification described in subsection 1 of this section in
- 134 order to vote:
- 135 (a) A birth certificate;
- 136 (b) A marriage license or certificate;
- 137 (c) A divorce decree;
- 138 (d) A certificate of decree of adoption;
- (e) A court order changing the person's name;
- 140 (f) A Social Security card reflecting an updated name;
- **141** and

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142 (g) Naturalization papers or other documents from the 143 United States Department of State proving citizenship.

144 Any individual seeking one of the above documents in order to obtain a form of personal photo identification described 145 146 in subsection 1 of this section for voting may request the secretary of state to facilitate the acquisition of such 147 148 documents. The secretary of state shall pay any fee or fees charged by another state or its agencies, or any court of 149 competent jurisdiction in this state or any other state, or 150 151 the federal government or its agencies, in order to obtain any of the above documents from such state or the federal 152 153 government.

- (3) Any applicant who requests a nondriver's license for voting shall not be required to pay a fee. The state of Missouri shall pay the legally required fees for any such applicant. The department of revenue and a local election authority may enter into a contract that allows the local election authority to assist the department in issuing nondriver's license photo identifications.
- 161 The director of the department of revenue shall, by 162 January first of each year, prepare and deliver to each 163 member of the general assembly a report documenting the number of individuals who have requested and received a 164 165 nondriver's license photo identification for the purposes of voting under this section. The report shall also include 166 167 the number of persons requesting a nondriver's license for purposes of voting under this section, but not receiving 168 169 such license, and the reason for the denial of the nondriver's license. 170

171 The precinct register shall serve as the voter 172 identification certificate. The secretary of state shall promulgate rules to effectuate the provisions of this section. 187 188 10. 115.430. 1. This section shall apply to [primary and general elections where candidates for federal or statewide offices are nominated or elected and any election where statewide issue or issues are submitted to the voters] any public election.

6 (1) A voter claiming to be properly registered in the jurisdiction of the election authority and eligible to 7 8 vote in an election, but whose eligibility at that precinct cannot be immediately established upon examination of the 9 precinct register, shall be entitled to vote a provisional 10 ballot after providing a form of personal identification 11 required pursuant to section 115.427 or upon executing an 12 affidavit under section 115.427, or may vote at a central 13 polling place as established in section 115.115 where the 14 15 voter may vote his or her appropriate ballot for his or her precinct of residence upon verification of eligibility or 16 vote a provisional ballot if eligibility cannot be 17 determined. The provisional ballot provided to a voter 18 19 under this section shall be the ballot provided to a resident of the voter's precinct determined by reference to 20 21 the affidavit provided for in this section. If the voter 22 declares that the voter is eligible to vote and the election authority determines that the voter is eligible to vote at 23 24 another polling place, the voter shall be directed to the correct polling place or a central polling place as 25 established by the election authority pursuant to subsection 26 5 of section 115.115. If the voter refuses to go to the 27

28 correct polling place or a central polling place, the voter

- 29 shall be permitted to vote a provisional ballot at the
- 30 incorrect polling place, but such ballot shall not be
- 31 counted if the voter was not eligible to vote at that
- 32 polling place.
- 33 (2) The following steps shall be taken to establish a
- voter's eligibility to vote at a polling place:
- 35 (a) The election judge shall examine the precinct
- 36 register as provided in section 115.425. If the voter is
- 37 registered and eligible to vote at the polling place, the
- 38 voter shall receive a regular ballot;
- 39 (b) If the voter's eligibility cannot be immediately
- 40 established by examining the precinct register, the election
- 41 judge shall contact the election authority. If the election
- 42 authority cannot immediately establish that the voter is
- 43 registered and eligible to vote at the polling place upon
- 44 examination of the Missouri voter registration system, or if
- 45 the election judge is unable to make contact with the
- 46 election authority immediately, the voter shall be notified
- 47 that the voter is entitled to a provisional ballot.
- 48 (3) The voter shall have the duty to appear and vote
- 49 at the correct polling place. If an election judge
- 50 determines that the voter is not eligible to vote at the
- 51 polling place at which a voter presents himself or herself,
- 52 and if the voter appears to be eligible to vote at another
- 53 polling place, the voter shall be informed that he or she
- 54 may cast a provisional ballot at the current polling place
- or may travel to the correct polling place or a central
- 56 polling place, as established by the election authority
- 57 under subsection 5 of section 115.115, where the voter may
- 58 cast a regular ballot or provisional ballot if the voter's
- 59 eligibility still cannot be determined. Provisional ballots

60 cast at a polling place shall be counted only if the voter 61 was eligible to vote at such polling place as provided in subsection 5 of this section. 62

- (4) For a voter requesting an absentee ballot in 63 person, such voter shall be entitled to cast a provisional 64 ballot when the voter's eligibility cannot be immediately 65 established upon examination of the precinct registers or 66 67 the Missouri voter registration system.
- 68 (5) Prior to accepting any provisional ballot at the 69 polling place, the election judges shall determine that the information provided on the provisional ballot envelope by 70 the provisional voter is consistent with the identification 71 72 provided by such person under section 115.427.
- 73 3. (1) No person shall be entitled to receive a provisional ballot until such person has completed a 74 75 provisional ballot affidavit on the provisional ballot 76 envelope.
- The secretary of state shall produce appropriate 77 78 sizes of provisional ballot envelopes and distribute them to each election authority according to their tabulating 79 system. All provisional ballot envelopes shall be printed 80 on a distinguishable color of paper that is different from 81 the color of the regular ballot. The provisional ballot 82 83 envelope shall be in the form required by subsection 4 of this section. All provisional ballots shall be marked with 84 85 a conspicuous stamp or other distinguishing mark that makes 86 them readily distinguishable from the regular ballots.
- (3) Once voted, the provisional ballot shall be placed 87 88 and sealed in a provisional ballot envelope.
- The provisional ballot in its envelope shall be 90 deposited in the ballot box. The provisional ballot envelope shall be completed by the voter for use in 91

- 127 election authority shall determine if the voter is

- 129 cast. The eligibility of provisional votes shall be
- 130 determined according to the requirements for a voter to cast
- a ballot in the election as set forth in sections 115.133
- and 115.135. A provisional voter ballot shall not be
- 133 eligible to be counted until the election authority has
- 134 determined that:
- 135 (a) The voter cast such provisional ballot at a
- 136 polling place established for the voter or the central
- 137 polling place established by the election authority under
- 138 subsection 5 of section 115.115;
- 139 (b) The individual who cast the provisional ballot is
- 140 an individual registered to vote in the respective election
- 141 at the polling place where the ballot was cast;
- 142 (c) The voter did not otherwise vote in the same
- 143 election by regular ballot, absentee ballot, or otherwise;
- **144** and
- 145 (d) The information on the provisional ballot envelope
- is found to be correct, complete, and accurate.
- 147 (2) When the ballot boxes are delivered to the
- 148 election authority from the polling places, the receiving
- 149 teams shall separate the provisional ballots from the rest
- of the ballots and place the sealed provisional ballot
- 151 envelopes in a separate container. Teams of election
- authority employees or teams of election judges with each
- 153 team consisting of one member of each major political party
- 154 shall photocopy each provisional ballot envelope, such
- 155 photocopy to be used by the election authority to determine

provisional voter eligibility. The sealed provisional ballot envelopes shall be placed by the team in a sealed container and shall remain therein until tabulation.

- (4) If the election authority determines that the provisional voter is registered and eligible to vote in the election, the election authority shall provide documentation verifying the voter's eligibility. Such documentation shall be noted on the copy of the provisional ballot envelope and shall contain substantially the following information:
 - (a) The name of the provisional voter;
 - (b) The name of the reviewer;

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- 178 (d) A description of evidence found that supports the voter's eligibility.
- 180 (5) The local election authority shall record on a
 181 provisional ballot acceptance/rejection list the provisional
 182 ballot identification number and a notation marking it as
 183 accepted.

 185 provisional voter is not registered or eligible to vote in

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- 239 If the person named on the provisional ballot affidavit is found not to have been properly qualified and 240 registered to cast a ballot in the election or if the 241 242 election authority is unable to determine such person's right to vote, the envelope containing the provisional 243 244 ballot shall not be opened, and the person's vote shall not be counted. The members of the team shall follow the 245 procedures set forth in subsection 5 of this section for 246 247 rejected provisional ballots.
- 248 (4) The votes shall be tallied and the returns made as 249 provided in sections 115.447 to 115.525 for paper ballots. 250 After the vote on all ballots assigned to a team have been

counted, the ballots, ballot envelopes, and copies of ballot 251 252 envelopes with the eligibility information provided by the 253 election authority shall be enclosed in sealed containers 254 marked "Voted provisional ballots and ballot envelopes from the election held _____, 20____". All rejected 255 256 provisional ballots, ballot envelopes, and copies of ballot envelopes with the eligibility information provided by the 257 258 election authority shall be enclosed in sealed containers 259 marked "Rejected provisional ballots and ballot envelopes from the election held , 20 ". On the outside of 260 each voted ballot and rejected ballot container, each member 261 of the team shall write their name and all such containers 262 shall be returned to the election authority. Upon receipt 263 264 of the returns and ballots, the election authority shall tabulate the provisional votes. 265 Challengers and watchers, as provided by sections 266 267 115.105 and 115.107, may be present during all times that the bipartisan counting teams are reviewing or counting the 268 269 provisional ballots, the provisional ballot envelopes, or copies of the provisional ballot envelopes that include 270 eligibility information provided by the election authority. 271 Challengers and watchers shall be permitted to observe the 272 determination of the eligibility of all provisional 273 274 ballots. The election authority shall notify the county 275 chair of each major political party of the time and location when bipartisan counting teams will be reviewing or counting 276 the provisional ballots, the provisional ballot envelopes, 277 or the copies of the provisional ballot envelopes that 278 include the eligibility information provided by the election 279 280 authority. 281

9. The certificate of ballot cards shall:

282 (1) Reflect the number of provisional envelopes 283 delivered; and

- 284 (2) Reflect the number of sealed provisional envelopes 285 with voted ballots deposited in the ballot box.
- 10. In counties where the voting system does not utilize a paper ballot, the election authority shall provide the appropriate provisional ballots to each polling place.
- 289 11. The secretary of state may promulgate rules for 290 purposes of ensuring the uniform application of this 291 section. No rule or portion of a rule promulgated pursuant 292 to the authority of this section shall become effective 293 unless it has been promulgated pursuant to chapter 536.
- 12. The secretary of state shall design and provide to the election authorities the envelopes and forms necessary to carry out the provisions of this section.
- 297 Pursuant to the Help America Vote Act of 2002, the 298 secretary of state shall ensure a free access system is established, such as a toll-free number or an internet 299 300 website, that any individual who casts a provisional ballot may access to discover whether the vote of that individual 301 302 was counted, and, if the vote was not counted, the reason 303 that the vote was not counted. At the time an individual casts a provisional ballot, the election authority shall 304 305 give the voter written information that states that any 306 individual who casts a provisional ballot will be able to 307 ascertain under such free access system whether the vote was 308 counted, and if the vote was not counted, the reason that the vote was not counted. 309
- 14. In accordance with the Help America Vote Act of
 2002, any individual who votes in an election as a result of
 a court order or any other order extending the time
 established for closing the polls in section 115.407 may

provisional ballot shall be separated and held apart from
other provisional ballots cast by those not affected by the
order. Such ballots shall not be counted until such time as
the ballots are determined to be valid. No state court
