AN ACT

To repeal section 565.002, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof two new sections relating to sports officials.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 565.002, RSMo, is repealed and two new

- 2 sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections
- 3 537.551 and 565.002, to read as follows:
 - 537.551. 1. For purposes of this section, the term
- 2 "sports officials" shall mean those individuals who serve as
- 3 referees, umpires, or linesmen or those individuals who
- 4 serve in similar capacities but may be known by other titles
- 5 and are duly registered or members of a local, state,
- 6 regional, or national organization that is engaged in part
- 7 in providing education and training to sports officials.
- 8 2. Sports officials who officiate athletic contests at
- 9 any level of competition in this state shall not be liable
- 10 to any person or entity in any civil action for injuries or
- 11 damages claimed to have arisen by virtue of actions or
- 12 inactions related in any manner to officiating duties within
- 13 the confines of the athletic facility at which the athletic
- 14 contests are played.
- 15 3. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to grant
- 16 the protection set forth to sports officials who cause
- 17 injury or damage to a person or entity by actions or

inactions that are intentional, willful, wanton, reckless,

19 malicious, or grossly negligent.

565.002. As used in this chapter, unless a different meaning is otherwise plainly required the following terms mean:

- 4 (1) "Adequate cause", cause that would reasonably
- 5 produce a degree of passion in a person of ordinary
- 6 temperament sufficient to substantially impair an ordinary
- 7 person's capacity for self-control;
- 8 (2) "Child", a person under seventeen years of age;
- 9 (3) "Conduct", includes any act or omission;
- 10 (4) "Course of conduct", a pattern of conduct composed
- 11 of two or more acts, which may include communication by any
- 12 means, over a period of time, however short, evidencing a
- 13 continuity of purpose. Constitutionally protected activity
- 14 is not included within the meaning of course of conduct.
- 15 Such constitutionally protected activity includes picketing
- or other organized protests;
- 17 (5) "Deliberation", cool reflection for any length of 18 time no matter how brief;
- 19 (6) "Domestic victim", a household or family member as
- 20 the term "family" or "household member" is defined in
- 21 section 455.010, including any child who is a member of the
- 22 household or family;
- 23 (7) "Emotional distress", something markedly greater
- 24 than the level of uneasiness, nervousness, unhappiness, or
- 25 the like which are commonly experienced in day-to-day living;
- 26 (8) "Full or partial nudity", the showing of all or
- 27 any part of the human genitals, pubic area, buttock, or any
- 28 part of the nipple of the breast of any female person, with
- 29 less than a fully opaque covering;

30 (9) "Legal custody", the right to the care, custody
31 and control of a child;

- 32 (10) "Parent", either a biological parent or a parent
- 33 by adoption;
- 34 (11) "Person having a right of custody", a parent or
- 35 legal guardian of the child;
- 36 (12) "Photographs" or "films", the making of any
- 37 photograph, motion picture film, videotape, or any other
- 38 recording or transmission of the image of a person;
- 39 (13) "Place where a person would have a reasonable
- 40 expectation of privacy", any place where a reasonable person
- 41 would believe that a person could disrobe in privacy,
- 42 without being concerned that the person's undressing was
- 43 being viewed, photographed or filmed by another;
- 44 (14) "Special victim", any of the following:
- 45 (a) A law enforcement officer assaulted in the
- 46 performance of his or her official duties or as a direct
- 47 result of such official duties;
- (b) Emergency personnel, any paid or volunteer
- 49 firefighter, emergency room, hospital, or trauma center
- 50 personnel, or emergency medical technician, assaulted in the
- 51 performance of his or her official duties or as a direct
- 52 result of such official duties;
- (c) A probation and parole officer assaulted in the
- 54 performance of his or her official duties or as a direct
- 55 result of such official duties;
- (d) An elderly person;
- 57 (e) A person with a disability;
- (f) A vulnerable person;
- 59 (g) Any jailer or corrections officer of the state or
- one of its political subdivisions assaulted in the

performance of his or her official duties or as a direct result of such official duties;

- (h) A highway worker in a construction or work zone as the terms "highway worker", "construction zone", and "work zone" are defined under section 304.580;
- (i) Any utility worker, meaning any employee of a
 utility that provides gas, heat, electricity, water, steam,
 telecommunications services, or sewer services, whether
 privately, municipally, or cooperatively owned, while in the
 performance of his or her job duties, including any person
 employed under a contract;
- (j) Any cable worker, meaning any employee of a cable operator, as such term is defined in section 67.2677, including any person employed under contract, while in the performance of his or her job duties; [and]
- 76 (k) Any employee of a mass transit system, including
 77 any employee of public bus or light rail companies, while in
 78 the performance of his or her job duties; or
- 79 A sports official assaulted while the sports 80 official is performing his or her duties as a sports official or as a direct result of such duties. A sports 81 official shall include, but not be limited to, a judge, 82 linesman, official, referee, or umpire. To qualify as a 83 84 sports official, a person shall be trained and certified or 85 registered as such by an organization engaged in the education, training, and certifying or registering of sports 86 officials; 87
- 88 (15) "Sudden passion", passion directly caused by and 89 arising out of provocation by the victim or another acting 90 with the victim which passion arises at the time of the 91 offense and is not solely the result of former provocation;

92 (16) "Trier", the judge or jurors to whom issues of 93 fact, guilt or innocence, or the assessment and declaration 94 of punishment are submitted for decision;

95 (17) "Views", the looking upon of another person, with 96 the unaided eye or with any device designed or intended to 97 improve visual acuity, for the purpose of arousing or 98 gratifying the sexual desire of any person.
