AN ACT

To amend chapter 170, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to elective social studies courses on the Bible.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 170, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto

- 2 one new section, to be known as section 170.341, to read as
- 3 follows:
 - 170.341. 1. Any school district or public charter
- 2 school may offer students elective social studies courses
- 3 relating, but not limited to, the following:
- 4 (1) The Hebrew Scriptures, the Old Testament of the
- 5 Bible;
- 6 (2) The New Testament of the Bible; or
- 7 (3) The Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament of the
- 8 Bible.
- 9 2. The purpose of a course under this section is to:
- 10 (1) Teach students knowledge of biblical content,
- 11 characters, poetry, and narratives that are prerequisites to
- 12 understanding contemporary society and culture, including
- 13 literature, art, music, mores, oratory, and public policy;
- 14 and
- 15 (2) Familiarize students with, as applicable:
- 16 (a) The contents of the Hebrew Scriptures or New
- 17 Testament;

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- 18 (b) The history of the Hebrew Scriptures or New 19 Testament;
- 20 (c) The literary style and structure of the Hebrew 21 Scriptures or New Testament; and
- 22 (d) The influence of the Hebrew Scriptures or New 23 Testament on law, history, government, literature, art, 24 music, customs, morals, values, and culture.
 - 3. A student shall not be required to use a specific translation as the sole text of the Hebrew Scriptures or New Testament and may use as the basic textbook a different translation of the Hebrew Scriptures or New Testament from that chosen by the school district or public charter school.
 - 4. A course offered under this section shall follow applicable law and all federal and state guidelines in maintaining religious neutrality and accommodating the diverse religious views, traditions, and perspectives of students in the school. A course offered under this section shall not endorse, favor, or promote, or disfavor or show hostility toward, any particular religion or nonreligious faith or religious perspective.
 - 5. School districts and public charter schools, in complying with this section, shall not violate any provision of the Constitution of the United States or federal law, the Constitution of Missouri or any state law, or any administrative regulations of the department of elementary and secondary education or the United States Department of Education.
