“Section 1. Nothing in sections 338.600, 376.387, 376.394, and 376.399 shall be construed as requiring the department of commerce and insurance, or any other state agency, to enforce any provisions of these sections on self-funded health benefit plans.”; and

SENATE AMENDMENT NO. 3

Amend Senate Substitute for Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bills Nos. 984 and 968, Page 1, In the Title, Line 4, by striking “pharmacy benefits managers” and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “pharmacies”; and

Further amend said bill and page, section A, line 4, by inserting after all of said line the following:

“338.312. 1. As used in this section, unless the context requires otherwise, the following terms mean:

(1) “Declared state disaster or emergency”, a disaster or emergency event for which a governor’s state of emergency proclamation has been issued or that the President of the United States has declared to be a major disaster or emergency;

(2) “Disaster period”, the period of time that begins ten days before a governor’s proclamation of a state of emergency or the declaration by the President of the United States of a major disaster or emergency, whichever occurs first, and extending for a period of sixty calendar days following the end of the period specified in the proclamation or declaration or sixty calendar days from the proclamation or declaration if no end is provided. The governor may extend the disaster period as warranted;

(3) “Nonprofit pharmacy”, any pharmacy licensed in this state that operates as a charitable organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

2. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the board of pharmacy shall have the authority to waive compliance with any Missouri rules and regulations for pharmacies licensed in this state when such nonprofit pharmacy is dispensing, shipping, or delivering prescription drugs into another state or United States territory that is experiencing a declared state disaster or emergency, provided that:

(1) The nonprofit pharmacy is a licensed pharmacy in good standing under this chapter and is authorized to ship prescription drugs into the state or territory in question;

(2) The nonprofit pharmacy is responding to an active declared state disaster or emergency;

(3) The nonprofit pharmacy complies with all emergency rules and regulations for pharmacies and nonprofit pharmacies established by the state or territory for the duration of the disaster period;

(4) The nonprofit pharmacy complies with all applicable federal laws and regulations; and

(5) The waiver applies only to prescription drugs dispensed, shipped, or delivered to residents or health care facilities located within the geographic area specified in the declared state disaster or emergency.

3. The board of pharmacy may promulgate rules to implement the provisions of this section. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2026, shall be invalid and void.”; and

Further amend the title and enacting clause accordingly.

Senator Gregory (15) offered SA 4:

SENATE AMENDMENT NO. 4

Amend Senate Substitute for Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bills Nos. 984 and 968, Page 11-14, Section 376.394, by striking all of said section from the bill; and

SENATE AMENDMENT NO. 5

Amend Senate Substitute for Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bills Nos. 984 and 968, Page 1, In the Title, Line 4, by striking “managers”; and

Further amend said bill, page 14, section 376.399, line 5, by inserting after all of said line the following:

“376.1240. 1. For purposes of this section, terms shall have the same meanings as ascribed to them in section 376.1350, and the term “self-administered hormonal contraceptive” shall mean a drug that is composed of one or more hormones and that is approved by the Food and Drug Administration to prevent pregnancy, excluding emergency contraception. Nothing in this section shall be construed to apply to medications approved by the Food and Drug Administration to terminate an existing pregnancy.

2. **(1)** Any health benefit plan delivered, issued for delivery, continued, or renewed in this state on or after January 1, 2026, that provides coverage for self-administered hormonal contraceptives shall provide coverage to reimburse a health care provider or dispensing entity for the dispensing of a supply of self-administered hormonal contraceptives intended to last up to ninety days, or intended to last up to one hundred eighty days for generic self-administered hormonal contraceptives. **The provisions of this subdivision shall no longer be in effect after December 31, 2026.**

(2) Any health benefit plan delivered, issued for delivery, continued, or renewed in this state on or after January 1, 2027, that provides coverage for self-administered hormonal contraceptives shall provide coverage to reimburse a health care provider or dispensing entity for the dispensing of a supply of self-administered hormonal contraceptives, including generic and brand-name contraceptives, intended to last up to one year.

3. The coverage required under this section shall not be subject to any greater deductible or co-payment than other similar health care services provided by the health benefit plan.

376.1960. 1. As used in this section, the following terms mean:

(1) “Health benefit plan”, the same meaning given to the term in section 376.1350;

(2) “Home blood pressure monitoring device”, a mobile device that can be used to measure blood pressure, and that is validated for clinical accuracy and device calibration;

(3) “Home blood pressure monitoring device services”, patient education and training services on the setup and use of a home blood pressure monitoring device, separate self-measurement blood pressure readings, daily collection and transmission of data reports by the patient or caregiver to the health care provider in order to communicate blood pressure readings, review of the reports by the health care provider, and creation or modification of treatment plans based on the reports.

2. Health benefit plans delivered, issued for delivery, continued or renewed in this state on or after January 1, 2026, and providing for maternity benefits, shall provide coverage for a home blood pressure monitoring device and home blood pressure monitoring device services for pregnant and postpartum women.”; and

Further amend the title and enacting clause accordingly.

SENATE AMENDMENT NO. 1

Amend Senate Substitute for Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 1065, Page 1, In the Title, Line 4, by striking “relocation” and inserting in lieu thereof the following: “location”; and

Further amend said bill, page 4, section 226.224, line 59, by inserting after all of said line the following:

“227.241. 1. For the purposes of this section, “electric transmission facilities” shall include public utilities, investor owned utilities, utility cooperatives, municipal utilities, transmission only entities, and merchant transmission line developers.

2. For the purposes of this section, the term “highway” shall mean the public thoroughfare for vehicles, including public interstate highways, freeways, controlled access highways, and state and county highways.

3. Within highway rights-of-way, subject to reasonable engineering, safety, and access requirements, the commission and the department of transportation shall allow the installation, operation, and maintenance of electric transmission facilities, including high voltage and interstate transmission facilities.

4. The commission and the Missouri department of transportation shall develop uniform criteria for longitudinal and parallel colocation of electric transmission facilities within highway rights-of-way.

5. The duties of the commission and the department shall include:

(1) Providing reasonable timelines and procedure for review and approval of colocation requests;

(2) Ensuring the safety of the public and infrastructure;

(3) Avoiding duplication of corridors where colocation is feasible; and

(4) Imposing reasonable conditions for construction, right-of-way access, maintenance coordination, and restoration but these conditions shall not interfere with colocation.

6. The commission and department shall jointly promulgate and enforce reasonable rules and regulations to implement the provisions of this section. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term

is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2026, shall be invalid and void.”; and

Further amend the title and enacting clause accordingly.
