FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, Department of Social Services**, and the **Department of Public Safety** – **Missouri State Highway Patrol** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agencies.

Officials with the **Office of the State Courts Administrator** assume this bill would create no fiscal impact on the Courts.

Officials from the **Office of the State Public Defender (SPD)** did not respond to Oversight's request for fiscal impact. However, in response to a similar proposal from the 2004 Session (SB 1210, LR # 4290-02), officials stated new crimes create new cases for the SPD. The exact number of cases affected is too uncertain to provide a definitive dollar amount of fiscal impact. Nevertheless, there will be some impact. Since the amount of impact is so uncertain, the SPD cannot assume existing staff will be able to provide representation in these cases. However, once the true impact is determined, the SPD will reassess the impact of this legislation. Passage of more than one bill increasing existing penalties, or creating new crimes, will require increased appropriations for the State Public Defender.

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<u>ASSUMPTION</u> (continued)

Officials from the **Office of Prosecution Services** assume the proposal would not have a significant direct fiscal impact on county prosecutors.

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** assume the proposal regulates international matchmaking organizations. The penalty provisions are for a class D felony.

Currently, the DOC cannot predict the number of new commitments which may result from the creation of the offenses(s) outlined in this proposal. An increase in commitments depends on the utilization by prosecutors and the actual sentences imposed by the court.

If additional persons are sentenced to the custody of the DOC due to the provisions of this legislation, the DOC will incur a corresponding increase in operational cost either through incarceration (FY04 average of \$38.37 per inmate per day, or an annual cost of \$14,005 per inmate) or through supervision provided by the Board of Probation and Parole (FY03 average of \$3.15 per offender per day, or an annual cost of \$1,150 per offender).

The following factors contribute to DOC's minimal assumption:

- DOC assumes the narrow scope of the crime will not encompass a large number of offenders;
- The low felony status of the crime enhances the possibility of plea-bargaining or imposition of a probation sentence; and
- The probability exists that offenders would be charged with a similar but more serious offense or that sentences may run concurrent to one another.

The DOC does not anticipate the need for capital improvements at this time. It must be noted that the cumulative effect of various new legislation, if passed into law, could result in the need for additional capital improvements funding if the total number of new offenders exceeds current planned capacity.

In summary, supervision by the DOC through probation or incarceration would result in some additional costs, but it is assumed the impact would be \$0 or a minimal amount that could be absorbed within existing resources.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation would define an international matchmaking organization as a legal entity that does business in the United States and for-profit offers to residents of Missouri, dating, matrimonial, or social referral services involving citizens of foreign countries who are not residing in the United States. Such business would include, but would not be limited to, the exchange of names, telephone numbers, addresses, and other information, the selection of photos, or the creation of a social environment in a country other than the United States. Such businesses would not include a traditional matchmaking organization of a religious nature or an organization that does not charge a fee.

The proposal would require international matchmaking organizations to provide notice to each recruit from another country that certain information regarding clients is available. Such an organization would be required to disseminate the criminal history record information and marital history information of a client along with basic rights information within 30 days after it receives the information.

A client of an organization would be required to obtain his or her own criminal history and give it to the organization along with the marital history information. The organization would require the client to affirm that the information is accurate and complete.

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DESCRIPTION (continued)

An organization would not provide any further services to the client or recruit until the required information is received and provided to the recruit. It would be a Class D felony to willfully provide incomplete or false information or to violate the requirements of notice and providing information as required by this section.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
