FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

In response to a previous version of this proposal, officials from the **Office of the State**Treasurer and the **Office of Administration**, **Division of Budget and Planning** assumed the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their organizations.

Oversight notes that this proposal would increase the amount which could be appropriated, transferred, or otherwise credited to the Governmental Emergency Fund from the current limit of \$100,000 per year to a new maximum which would be initially set at \$850,000 and then adjusted annually beginning July 1, 2007 by the same percentage as the increase in the United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index. Oversight assumes that all or virtually all of this funding would be transferred or appropriated from the General Revenue Fund.

The United States Department of Labor Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers has increased by 2.1%, 3.3%, and 2.5% over the three years ended June 30, 2005 for an average increase of 2.6%. Oversight assumes the new maximum which could be appropriated or transferred to the Governmental Emergency Fund as of June 30, 2007 would be approximately \$850,000 X 1.026 = \$872,100, representing an increase of \$772,100. Oversight has ranged the impact to the General Revenue Fund and the Governmental Emergency Fund from \$0 to 772,100 for FY 2007, from \$0 to \$792,200 for FY 2008, and from \$0 to \$812,800 for FY 2009.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Senate Amendment 1;

In response to a similar proposal from this year (SB 889), officials from the **Office of State** Courts Administrator, the Department of Social Services, the Department of Public Safety -Director's Office, the Department of Public Safety - State Emergency Management Agency, and the Department of Economic Development - Division of Professional Registration assumed the proposal would not fiscally impact their agencies.

In response to a similar proposal from this year (SB 889), officials from the **Department of** Mental Health (DMH) stated the proposal does not specify any approval procedures on the part of management, but DMH assumes an employee would be required to obtain some approval from the appointing authority authorizing release to participate in such volunteer activities. DMH assumed that no detriment to the level of care administered by DMH facilities would result from this proposal. DMH assumed that emergency deployment of staff would not be so great as to require any new staff, expense, or equipment.

In response to a similar proposal from this year (SB 889), officials from the **Department of** Health and Senior Services (DOH) assumed this proposal would not fiscally impact their agency. DOH assumed if a fiscal impact were to result, funds to support the program would be sought through the appropriation process.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

This proposal would increase the maximum amount that may be appropriated to the Governmental Emergency Fund from one hundred fifty thousand dollars to eight hundred fifty thousand dollars per year. The annual maximum would also be adjusted annually based on the increase in the Consumer Price Index.

Senate Amendment 1 states volunteer health care providers from other states may be deployed to provide health care necessitated by an emergency. Deployed volunteers will not be liable for civil damages for acts or omissions other than damages due to the willful or wanton acts or omissions in rendering such care.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
