FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Health and Senior Services**, **Department of Social Services**, **Missouri Consolidated Health Care Plan**, and the **Department of Insurance** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agencies.

In response to a previous version of the proposal (SB 1041, LR # 5118-01), officials from the Office of the Attorney General and the Department of Public Safety – Missouri State Highway Patrol assumed the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agencies.

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator** assume the proposed legislation would have no fiscal impact on the courts.

Officials from the **Office of Prosecution Services** assume the proposal will not have a significant direct fiscal impact on county prosecutors, although it may lead to an increase in prosecutions/caseloads.

<u>ASSUMPTION</u> (continued)

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** assume they cannot predict the number of new commitments which may result from the creation of the offense(s) outlined in this proposal. An increase in commitments depends on the utilization by prosecutors and the actual sentences imposed by the court.

If additional persons are sentenced to the custody of the DOC due to the provisions of this legislation, the DOC will incur a corresponding increase in operational cost either through incarceration (FY05 average of \$39.13 per inmate, per day or an annual cost of \$14,282 per inmate) or through supervision provided by the Board of Probation and Parole (FY03 average of \$3.15 per offender, per day or an annual cost of \$1,150 per offender).

In summary, supervision by the DOC through probation or incarceration would result in additional unknown costs to the department. Eight (8) persons would have to be incarcerated per fiscal year to exceed \$100,000 annually. Due to the narrow scope of this new crime, it is assumed the impact would be less than \$100,000 per year for the DOC.

Officials from the Office of the State Public Defender did not respond to Oversight's request for fiscal impact.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation creates the crime of knowingly receiving, selling, or obtaining personal health information without the person's consent. There are exemptions for law enforcement officers performing their official duties. There are also exemptions for health care providers obtaining, using, disclosing, or permitting access to any personal health information record as otherwise authorized or required by state or federal law. Personal health information is defined as any identifiable information, in electronic or physical form, regarding the individual's health, medical history, medical treatment or diagnosis by a health care provider. Nothing in this proposal shall be construed to prohibit a health carrier from obtaining personal health information for the purposes of completing insurance applications, underwriting purposes, adjudication claims, and conducting other insurance-related business while complying with the provisions of all federal and state statutes and rules. "Personal health information" is defined as any identifiable information, in electronic or physical form, regarding the individual's health, medical history, medical treatment or diagnosis by a health care provider.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
