### FISCAL ANALYSIS

### **ASSUMPTION**

Officials from the **Department of Transportation**, **Department of Public Safety** – **Missouri State Highway Patrol**, and the – **Director's Office** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agencies.

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator** assume the proposed legislation would have no fiscal impact on the courts.

Officials from the **Department of Revenue** assume the proposal would have minimal impact, as the changes are procedural.

Oversight assumes Department of Revenue could absorb any costs within existing resources.

Officials from the **Office of Prosecution Services** assume the proposal will not have a significant direct fiscal impact on county prosecutors, although it may lead to an increase in prosecutions/caseloads.

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### <u>ASSUMPTION</u> (continued)

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** assume when an accident as defined in this bill causes a death, the person who collides with a stopped school bus could be charged with a class C felony. This person could possibly already be charged with involuntary manslaughter, although passage of this proposal my make it easier to arrest and/or convict. Charges of a class D felony, however, for injury to said children is a different matter. Statistics from officials at the Missouri State Highway Patrol show 57 such injuries for bus collisions in 2004 and 47 injuries in 2005. Even if half of the injury cases were admitted to the DOC, the impact has the potential to exceed \$100,000 per annum for the DOC.

Currently, the DOC cannot predict the number of new commitments which may result from the creation of the offense(s) outlined in this proposal. An increase in commitments depends on the utilization by prosecutors and the actual sentences imposed by the court.

If additional persons are sentenced to the custody of the DOC due to the provisions of this legislation, the DOC will incur a corresponding increase in operational cost either through incarceration (FY05 average of \$39.13 per inmate, per day or an annual cost of \$14,282 per inmate) or through supervision provided by the Board of Probation and Parole (FY03 average of \$3.15 per offender, per day or an annual cost of \$1,150 per offender).

In summary, supervision by the DOC through incarceration or probation would result in additional costs and although the exact fiscal impact is unknown, it is estimated that potential costs will be in excess of \$100,000 per year.

# Officials from the Office of the State Public Defender did not respond to Oversight's request for fiscal impact.

### FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

### **DESCRIPTION**

The proposed legislation enhances the penalties for those who fail to stop for school buses that are loading or unloading children. Under the proposal, any person who fails to properly yield or stop for a school bus and it results in the injury of any child shall be guilty of a class D felony. Any person who fails to properly yield for a school bus where such violation causes the death of any child shall be guilty of a class C felony.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
