FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety – Director's Office** and the **– Missouri State Highway Patrol** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agencies.

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator** assume the proposed legislation would have no fiscal impact on the courts.

Officials from the **Department of Natural Resources (DNR)** assume there would be fiscal impact from this proposal because they would need to implement a tracking system to manage the information required by the proposal. There would also be costs associated with training employees tasked with collecting, maintaining, and distributing, if requested by the public, such required information. Officials assume the cost would not exceed \$100,000 per fiscal year.

Oversight assumes the **Department of Natural Resources (DNR)** could absorb the costs of the proposed legislation within existing resources. Oversight assumes any significant increase in the workload of the DNR would be reflected in future budget requests.

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** assume they cannot currently predict the number of new commitments which may result from the creation of the offense(s) outlined in this proposal. An increase in commitments depends on the utilization by prosecutors and the actual sentences imposed by the court.

If additional persons are sentenced to the custody of the DOC due to the provisions of this legislation, the DOC will incur a corresponding increase in operational cost through supervision provided by the Board of Probation and Parole (FY07 average of \$2.43 per offender per day, or an annual cost of \$887 per offender).

In summary, supervision by the DOC through probation or incarceration would result in some additional costs, but it is assumed the impact would be \$0 or a minimal amount that could be absorbed within existing resources.

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<u>ASSUMPTION</u> (continued)

Officials from the **Office of Prosecution Services (OPS)** state they are not aware of any estimates of the number of additional criminal cases that would be referred to county prosecutors for charges because of this proposed legislation. Additionally, the OPS is not otherwise able to establish a workable estimate of the number of additional criminal cases that would be referred to county prosecutors for charges, though it is not believed that a significant number of additional criminal case referrals would result. Notwithstanding these uncertainties, OPS assumes any fiscal impact would not be significant.

Oversight assumes the Office of Prosecution Services and county prosecutors could absorb any additional costs incurred as a result of the proposed legislation within existing resources.

Officials from the **Office of the State Public Defender (SPD)** assume this new crime will require more SPD resources. While the number of new cases (or cases with increased penalties) may be too few or uncertain to request additional appropriations for this specific bill, the SPD will continue to request sufficient appropriations to provide competent and effective representation in all its cases.

Oversight assumes the Office of the State Public Defender (SPD) could absorb the costs of the proposed legislation within existing resources. Oversight assumes any significant increase in the workload of the SPD would be reflected in future budget requests.
