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#### FISCAL ANALYSIS

### **ASSUMPTION**

In response to a previous version of this proposal officials at the **Budget and Planning** assume there should be no added cost to the Budget and Planning as a result of this bill. This proposal changes statutes to reflect the transfer of the Crime Victims Compensation Program from the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations to the Department of Public Safety. This transfer was made in 2007 by Executive Order 07-07.

Officials at the **Office of the Attorney General** assume that any potential costs arising from this proposal can be absorbed with existing resources.

Officials at the Department of Revenue, Department of Public Safety, Office of the State Treasurer, Department of Labor and Industrial Relations and the Department of Health and Senior Services assume that there is no fiscal impact from this proposal.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** state many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$2,500. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, the SOS also recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with the core budget. Therefore, the SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

**Oversight** assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could request funding through the appropriation process.
