FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials at the **Department of Social Services** assume currently a court has the authority to suspend the execution of an adult sentence for certain juvenile offenders who are covered by dual jurisdiction. This bill expands the court's options by allowing the court to suspend imposition of the adult criminal sentence, not to just temporarily postpone the execution of the sentence while the youth is in the Division of Youth Services (DYS) care.

The DYS anticipates no fiscal impact. This legislation may affect youth served by DYS' Dual Jurisdiction Program, predominantly as they exit the program. Use of this expanded statutory option will broaden the scope of potential outcomes for cases accepted into DYS's Dual Jurisdiction Program.

For instance a young person's criminal record will be viewed more favorably if, after successful completion of the Dual Jurisdiction Program (the juvenile disposition), the court continues to suspend the imposition of the adult sentence. The young person may then go on to complete probation successfully and may avoid ever having an adult sentence imposed.

Officials at the **Office of the State Courts Administrator (CTS)** assume this proposal would not have a fiscal impact in excess of \$100,000.

Oversight assumes that any costs from CTS relating to this proposal could be absorbed within their current appropriation level.

Officials at the Office of Prosecution Services, Department of Corrections and the Office of the State Public Defender each assume no fiscal impact to their respective agencies from this proposal.
