FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Natural Resources (DNR)** state the proposal creates the option, but does not require, first responders to administer the medication. The DNR would not anticipate a fiscal impact from this legislation.

Due to time constraints, **Oversight** is referring to the response for a previous version of this proposal. In that response, officials from the **Department of Mental Health, the Department of Health and Senior Services, the Department of Social Services - MO HealthNet Division, the Department of Public Safety - Missouri State Highway Patrol, the Missouri Department of Conservation, the Office of Administration - General Services Division** and the **Springfield Police Department** each assumed the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the following **law enforcement agencies**: Boone County Sheriff, Buchanan County Sheriff, Clark County Sheriff, Cole County Sheriff, Columbia Police, Eureka, Independence Police, Jackson County Sheriff, Jefferson City Police, Platte County Sheriff, St. Joseph Police, St. Louis County Department of Police, and St. Louis Metro Police did not respond to **Oversight's** request for fiscal impact.

Officials from **St. Charles County Ambulance, Taney County Ambulance, and Valle Ambulance District** did not respond to **Oversight's** request for a statement of fiscal impact.

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.


FISCAL DESCRIPTION
