Bill Summary: This proposal restricts the storage and use as evidence of data collected through automated license plate reader systems by government agencies.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety - Missouri Highway Patrol, Department of Public Safety - Office of the Director, Department of Revenue, Department of Transportation, the Office of the State Courts Administrator, the City of Kansas City, and the Springfield Police Department** each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** state this bill creates one new crime – a class D Felony – which would be monitored by the Department of Corrections. While it is not known specifically how this crime would impact the DOC, estimates for a D felony are based on the impact of other nonviolent felonies.

The FY15 average cost of supervision is \$6.04 per offender per day or an annual cost of \$2,205 per offender. The DOC cost of incarceration is \$16.809 per day or an annual cost of \$6,135 per offender.

In summary, supervision by the DOC would likely result in additional costs of probation or incarceration for each additional offender sentenced under this legislation of \$11,344 in FY 2017 (1.5 persons in prison and 2.0 persons under supervision), \$19,508 in FY 2018 (1.5 persons in prison and 4.5 persons under supervision), and \$26,780 in FY 2019 (1.5 persons in prison and 7.5 persons under supervision).

Oversight will assume the DOC could absorb housing/supervising the relatively low number of anticipated offenders resulting from this proposal.

According to officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)**, many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$2,500. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, we also recognize that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what our office can sustain with our core budget. Therefore, we reserve the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Oversight assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could request funding through the appropriation process.

Officials from the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules** state this legislation is not anticipated to cause a fiscal impact beyond its current appropriation.

Officials from the **Office of Prosecution Services (OPS)** assume the proposal would not have a measurable fiscal impact on their agency. The creation of a new crime creates additional responsibilities for county prosecutors which may, in turn, result in additional costs which are difficult to determine.

For the purpose of this proposed legislation, officials at the **Office of State Public Defender (SPD)** cannot assume that existing staff will provide effective representation for any new cases arising where indigent persons are charged with the proposed new crime of misuse of a license plate reader or the information obtained by the reader - a new class D felony.

While the number of new cases (or cases with increased penalties) may be too few or uncertain to request additional funding for this specific bill, the SPD will continue to request sufficient appropriations to provide effective representation in all cases where the right to counsel attaches.

Oversight assumes the SPD can absorb the additional caseload that may result from this proposal.

Officials from the Attorney General's Office, Independence Police Department, Jackson County Sheriff, Platte County Sheriff, St. Charles Police Department, St. Joseph Police Department, St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department, and the St. Louis County Police Department did not respond to **Oversight's** request for fiscal impact.
