FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials at the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education** assume there is no fiscal impact to the Department from this proposal.

Officials at the **Bakersfield R-IV School District** assume this would have a vast and unpredictable fluctuation in costs. It could be as low as \$500 to as high as \$30,000.

Officials at the **Wright City R-II School District** assume the cost is unknown, but would be a cost for uniforms and potentially transportation. Example. Band is 130 kids. If we had a 10% bump from home school kids, that is now 143 kids. 13 band uniforms would cost around \$6,760 (current ones cost \$520 per person), plus dry cleaning. Since the district does not know the participation rate, we will assume this could cost from \$0 to \$10,000.

Officials at the **West Plains School District** assume there would be additional costs for equipment, uniforms, dues and insurance. The estimated expense is \$10,000 to \$25,000 annually.

Officials at the **Wentzville R-IV School District** assume the cost is approximately \$1,000 per student per activity for additional materials needed to participate in the activity. The district has 120 high school home school students. If half participate this could cost \$60,000.

Officials at the **Special School District of St. Louis** assume that as long as the home school student is required to ride the extracurricular bus from the school and not their home, then the cost would be minimal.

Officials at the **Kansas City Public Schools** see little to no negative impact from this proposal.

Officials at the **Pettis County R-XII School District** assume a cost of less than \$1,000 per year.

Officials at the **Bowling Green**, **Everton R-III**, **Kirksville R-III**, **Malta Bend**, **Parkway**, **Seymour R-II** and the **Warren County R-III School Districts** each assume this proposal would not have a fiscal impact on their school district.

Officials at the **Middle Grove School District** responded to Oversight's request for fiscal impact but did not indicate an impact.

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<u>ASSUMPTION</u> (continued)

Oversight notes this proposal would allow a student that is home schooled to participate in any extracurricular activity offered by their school district in the same manner provided enrolled students. Oversight notes that the home school student would be responsible for the same policies regarding registration, eligibility, fees, insurance, transportation, physical condition qualifications and responsibilities as enrolled students.

Oversight notes that many of the extracurricular activities offered by school districts limit the number of students that can participate (example- students on a sports team). This proposal would expand those eligible to try out but not increase the number that could participate. Therefore, the school districts would not incur any additional expenses in those situations.

Oversight notes that in extracurricular activities that do not limit the number of students that can participate (such as band, choir or robotics) there are often fees associated with joining or travel. Oversight assumes that in any extracurricular activity that assesses a fee the additional costs would be offset and the impact to the district would be zero.
