FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials at the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education** assume that the current school report card that is published could be altered to present the data and school grade assignments without significant costs.

Officials at the **West Plains School District** assume it is unknown how this will impact the school. Based on the grade it could lead to misconceptions and assumptions that would decrease the enrollment and begin a loss of revenue by negatively influencing industry. Based on the grade it could increase enrollment and be a positive for industry. The impact at this time is unknown until DESE assigns the grades.

Officials at the **Seymour R-II School District** assume additional costs of \$300 for mailing to the parents who don't have email and for the manpower to track, prepare and distribute the data.

Officials at the **Concordia R-II School District** assume no impact if DESE distributes information.

Officials at the **Eldon School District** assume they do not have email for all parents so there would be costs based on the number they must notify by mail. It is unknown at this time.

Officials at the Bakersfield, Everton R-III, Kansas City, Parkway, Pettis County R-XII, Special School District of St. Louis, Wentzville R-IV and the Warren County R-III school districts each assume there is no fiscal impact from this proposal to their respective district.

Officials at the **Kirksville R-III School District** responded to Oversight's request for fiscal impact but did not indicate an impact.

Oversight notes this proposal requires the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) to develop a simplified annual school report card and to post the report card on the DESE website. Additionally, each school district must distribute the report card prior to each school year. In this proposal it allows the school districts to distribute the report card through electronic mail. Therefore, school districts should be able to absorb the costs of the distribution of the report card with existing resources.

Officials at the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules** assume there is no fiscal impact from this proposal.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** state many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$2,500. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, the SOS also recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with the core budget. Therefore, the SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

Oversight assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could request funding through the appropriation process.
