FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety - Missouri Highway Patrol (MHP)** assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their agency. MHP states most offenses for prostitution appear to be prosecuted at the local level under some type of ordinance violation. Because of that, there are very few offenses for prostitution submitted each year to the MHP criminal records database. There were only 17 records of this nature submitted to the MHP in 2016. Due to the low number of records of this type submitted each year, if some type of expungement is required and it meets the criteria of this law, the MHP can absorb the work with no fiscal impact.

Officials from the **Springfield Police Department** and the **Department of Corrections** each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Attorney General's Office** assume that any potential costs arising from this proposal could be absorbed with existing resources.

Officials from the **Office of the State Courts Administrator** state there may be some impact, but there is no way to quantify that currently. Any significant changes will be reflected in future budget requests.

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

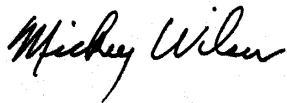
FISCAL DESCRIPTION
