FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

§9.270 - Posttraumatic Stress Awareness Day

Officials from the **Office of Administration** assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization.

§§208.217, 552.020, 630.745 and 630.945 - Provisions relating to mental health

Officials from the **Department of Mental Health (DMH)** state the DMH assumes no fiscal impact should this legislation pass. Disproportionate Share Hospital payments generates approximately \$130 million in additional revenues for the state.

Officials from the **Department of Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration**, the **Department of Labor and Industrial Relations**, the **Department of Social Services**, the **Missouri Consolidated Health Care Plan**, the **Missouri Office of Prosecution Services** and the **Office of State Courts Administrator** each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Office of Administration** and the **Office of State Public Defender** each assumed the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

§§337.025 - 337.165 - Licensure as a psychologist if program meets certain requirements and Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact

Officials from the **Department of Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration (DIFP)** state the compact will be effective when it is enacted into law in the seventh member state. Currently, two states have enacted the compact and seven other states (including Missouri) have introduced legislation to enact the compact. It is uncertain if the compact would be enacted in FY19, FY20, or FY21. Once the compact is enacted, the DIFP, Division of Professional Registration would have the following fiscal impact: \$3,000 to \$6,000 annual fee to participate in the compact.

Oversight notes the DIFP has modified its response from the one provided for similar legislation from the current session (SB 733) as a result of receiving clarification regarding licensure fees for practitioners wishing to participate under the compact. It has been determined that any interjurisdictional licensing fees would go to the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards rather than to the State of Missouri.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Officials from the **Office of Attorney General (AGO)** assume any potential costs arising from this proposal can be absorbed with existing resources. The AGO may seek additional appropriations if the proposal results in a significant increase in litigation.

Officials from the **Department of Mental Health, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Social Services, Office of the Governor** and the **Office of State Courts Administrator** each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

In response to the previous version of this proposal, officials from the **Department of Higher Education** assumed the proposal would not fiscally impact their agency.

§632.005 - Psychiatric physician assistants, psychiatric assistant physicians, and advanced practice registered nurses to provide psychiatric treatment to certain mental health patients

Officials from the **Department of Mental Health** assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their agency.

Officials from the **Department of Social Services (DSS), MO HealthNet Division (MHD)** state this legislation revises chapter 632 by adding definitions for psychiatric assistant physician and psychiatric physician assistant under chapter 334.

This legislation only adds definitions to chapter 632, but does not change MO HealthNet reimbursement under Chapter 208, RSMo, or impact MO HealthNet health care plans regulated under Chapter 376, RSMo.

Therefore, MHD assumes there would be no fiscal impact for Managed Care or Fee-for-Service with regard to utilization of services. However, there would be an estimated negative impact of \$67,000 for adding a new specialty. The total cost includes updating rules, prior authorization processing, and updates to the ad hoc reporting tool. This impact would be in FY19, and would be a 50/50 split among State and Federal.

MHD assumes services provided by psychiatric physician assistant and psychiatric assistant physician will be paid from DMH budget, therefore MHD defers to DMH for costs associated.

Officials from the **Department of Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration, the Department of Public Safety, Missouri State Highway Patrol, the Missouri Consolidated Health Care Plan, the Missouri Department of Conservation** and the **Missouri Department of Transportation** each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

This proposal could impact small business practitioners if they choose to obtain a certificate to practice in a compact member state. (§§337.100 - 337.165)

This proposal may positively impact small business physicians offices that might provide psychiatric treatment using physician assistants or assistant physicians. (§632.005)

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

This bill also adopts the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact in order to regulate the day-to-day practice of telepsychology by psychologists across state boundaries. The compact regulates psychological services using telecommunication technologies only, it does not apply to in-person, face-to-face practice by an out-of-state psychologist except to authorize the temporary in-person, face-to-face practice of psychology by psychologists across state boundaries for up to 30 days per calendar year. (§§337.100 - 337.165)

FISCAL DESCRIPTION (continued)

This bill adds psychiatric physician assistants, psychiatric assistant physicians and advanced practice registered nurses who are licensed under chapter 334 to the definition of mental health professionals for the purposes of Chapter 632, RSMo. (§632.005)

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
