FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Office of Administration** (Facilities Management Design and Construction and the **Division of Purchasing**) assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization.

Officials from the **Office of Administration - Budget and Planning (B&P)** assume that if this bill caps the amount of contingency fees a private attorney can recover in the act of representing the state, this could mean, in some cases, the state might retain a larger portion of settlements/awards. Court awards and settlements are counted in the TSR calculation.

Oversight assumes the potential impact described by B&P could be considered either speculative or not a <u>direct</u> fiscal impact of the proposal; therefore, Oversight will not reflect it in the fiscal note.

Officials from the **Attorney General's Office (AGO)** assume any potential cost arising from this proposal can be absorbed with existing resources. AGO may seek additional appropriations if the proposal results in a significant increase in cases.

Officials from the **Office of the State Auditor** assume any potential cost arising from this proposal can be absorbed with existing resources.

Officials from the **Office of the State Courts Administrator** assume there may be some impact but no way to quantify it currently. Any significant changes will be reflected in future budget request.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** assume many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the Secretary of State's Office for Administrative Rules is less than \$2,500. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, we also recognize that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what our office can sustain with our core budget. Therefore, we reserve the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Oversight assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could request funding through the appropriation process.

Officials from the Department of Agriculture, Department of Economic Development (Public Service Commission, Office of the Public Council, and the Division of Energy), Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, Department of Higher Education, Department of Health and Senior Services, Department of Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration, Department of Mental Health, Department of Natural Resources, Department of Corrections, Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, Department of Revenue, Department of Public Safety (Office of the Director, Capitol Police, Alcohol & Tobacco Control, Fire Safety, Gaming Commission, Missouri Highway Patrol, State Emergency Management Agency and the Veterans Commission) Department of Social Services, Office of the Governor, Joint Committee on Administrative Rules, Missouri Lottery Commission, Missouri Consolidated Health Care Plan, Missouri Department of Conservation, Missouri Ethics Commission, Missouri House of Representatives, Office of the Lieutenant Governor, Department of Transportation, Office of Prosecution Services, Administrative Hearing Commission, Office of the State Courts Administrator, Office of the State Auditor, Missouri Senate, Office of the State Public Defender, Office of the State Treasurer and the State Tax Commission each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations.
