FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** assume this proposal modifies provisions relating to the certification of juveniles for trial as adults. The proposed legislation does not provide any new penalties or offenses, but increases the likelihood that a juvenile could be transferred to a court of general jurisdiction and sentenced there under section 211.071. It is unknown how many juveniles will be transferred to a court of general jurisdiction; therefore, the DOC will have to assume an unknown fiscal impact.

Oversight does not have information to the contrary and therefore, Oversight will reflect the estimate as provided by the DOC.

Officials from the Office of the State Courts Administrator, the Attorney General's Office, the Department of Social Services, the Missouri Office of Prosecution Services and the Office of the State Public Defender each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations. Oversight does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note for these agencies.

In response to similar legislation from this year, HB 1367, officials from the **Missouri Highway Patrol** assumed the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization. **Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note.

FISCAL IMPACT – Small Business

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

Under current law, a child between the ages of 12 and 18 years may be tried in a court of general jurisdiction and prosecuted under general law. This act raises the age of certification of a child for trial as an adult to the age of 14.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
