Bill Summary: This proposal creates provisions relating to abortion and assistance to pregnant women and families.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

SJR - Abortion and assistance to pregnant women and families

Officials from **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** assume, each year, a number of joint resolutions that would refer to a vote of the people a constitutional amendment and bills that would refer to a vote of the people the statutory issue in the legislation may be considered by the General Assembly.

Unless a special election is called for the purpose, Joint Resolutions proposing a constitutional amendment are submitted to a vote of the people at the next general election. Article XII section 2(b) of the Missouri Constitution authorizes the governor to order a special election for constitutional amendments referred to the people. If a special election is called to submit a Joint Resolution to a vote of the people, section 115.063.2 RSMo requires the state to pay the costs. The cost of the special election has been estimated to be \$8 million based on the cost of the 2022 primary and general election reimbursements.

The Secretary of State's office is required to pay for publishing in local newspapers the full text of each statewide ballot measure as directed by Article XII, Section 2(b) of the Missouri Constitution and Section 116.230-116.290, RSMo. Funding for this item is adjusted each year depending upon the election cycle. A new decision item is requested in odd numbered fiscal years and the amount requested is dependent upon the estimated number of ballot measures that will be approved by the General Assembly and the initiative petitions certified for the ballot. In FY 2014, the General Assembly changed the appropriation so that it was no longer an estimated appropriation.

For the FY25 petitions cycle, the SOS estimates publication costs at \$60,000 per page. This amount is subject to change based on number of petitions received, length of those petitions and rates charged by newspaper publishers.

The Secretary of State's office will continue to assume, for the purposes of this fiscal note, that it should have the full appropriation authority it needs to meet the publishing requirements. Because these requirements are mandatory, the SOS reserves the right to request funding to meet the cost of the publishing requirements if the Governor and the General Assembly again change the amount or continue to not designate it as an estimated appropriation.

Oversight has reflected, in this fiscal note, the state potentially reimbursing local political subdivisions the cost of having this joint resolution voted on during a special election in fiscal year 2025. This reflects the decision made by the Joint Committee on Legislative Research that the cost of the elections should be shown in the fiscal note. The next scheduled statewide general

election is in November 2024 (FY 2025). It is assumed the subject within this proposal could be on this ballot; however, it could also be on a special election called for by the Governor (a different date). Therefore, Oversight will reflect a potential election cost reimbursement to local political subdivisions in FY 2025.

Officials from the **Office of the State Public Defender (SPD)** state, per the recently released National Public Defense Workload Study, the new charge contemplated by this change to Amendment III, Section 38(e) would take approximately thirty-five to fifty-seven hours of SPD work for reasonably effective representation. If one hundred cases were filed under this section in a fiscal year, representation would result in a need for an additional two to three attorneys. Because the number of cases that will be filed under this statute is unknown, the exact additional number of attorneys necessary is unknown. Each case would also result in unknown increased costs in the need for core staff, travel, and litigation expenses.

Oversight assumes this proposal will not create the number of new cases required to request additional FTE for the SPD and that the SPD can absorb the additional caseload required by this proposal with current staff and resources. Therefore, Oversight will reflect no fiscal impact to the SPD for fiscal note purposes. However, if multiple bills pass which require additional staffing and duties, the SPD may request funding through the appropriation process.

Officials from the **Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS)** state this proposal allows voters to decide whether to amend Article III of the Missouri Constitution. The SJR would allow abortions to take place in a medical emergency that threatens the life of the mother; a medical emergency for which a delay will create a serious risk of substantial and irreversible physical impairment of a major bodily function of the pregnant woman; or in cases of severe consequences for the unborn child.

Should the amendment be adopted by voters, the Division of Regulation and Licensure's Section for Health Standards and Licensure would continue to license, inspect, and survey facilities with current staff.

It is assumed that the Department can absorb the costs of this proposed amendment with current resources. However, if the workload significantly increased or other legislation was enacted, additional resources would be requested through the appropriation process.

Oversight does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note for DHSS.

Officials from the **Missouri Office of Prosecution Services (MOPS)** state there is no measurable fiscal impact to MOPS. The enactment of a new crime creates additional responsibilities for county prosecutors and the circuit attorney which may in turn result in additional costs which are difficult to determine.

Oversight assumes because the potential for additional new responsibilities is speculative that MOPS will not incur significant cost related to this proposal. If a fiscal impact were to result, the MOPS may request additional funding through the appropriation process.

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** state, as penalties are already in existing law, this legislation is anticipated to cause no impact to the department. **Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note.

Officials from the **Department of Commerce and Insurance**, the **Department of Public Safety**, **Missouri Highway Patrol**, the **Department of Revenue**, the **Department of Social Services**, the **Office of Administration - Budget and Planning**, the **Office of the Governor**, the **Office of the State Treasurer**, the **State Tax Commission**, the **Jackson County Board of Election Commissioners**, the **Platte County Election Authority**, the **St. Louis City Board of Elections** and the **St. Louis County Board of Elections** each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations. **Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note for these agencies.

Officials from the **Attorney General’s Office** and the **Office of the State Courts Administrator** did not respond to Oversight’s request for a statement of fiscal impact.

Oversight only reflects the responses received from state agencies and political subdivisions; however, other local election authorities and hospitals were requested to respond to this proposed legislation but did not. A listing of political subdivisions included in the Missouri Legislative Information System (MOLIS) database is available upon request.

The proposed legislation appears to have no direct fiscal impact.

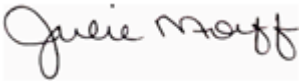
This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.

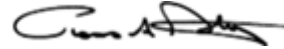
