FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Section 170.025 Instruction in Cursive Writing

Officials from the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education** assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization. **Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note to this agency.

Officials from **Concordia R-II School District** assume a cost of \$3,000 for curriculum as well as approximately \$20,000 per year in instruction time.

Officials from **Sedalia School District** assume schools already have the ability to provide cursive writing. If it were to become mandatory, then additional time and teaching would be necessary to implement. This could entail hundreds of thousands across a district like theirs if they hired extra teachers to implement.

Officials from the **Green Forest R-II School District** assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization.

In response to a similar proposal, HB 108 (2021), officials from the **Bowling Green R-1 School District** stated this proposal is redundant. This is already a communications arts standard in Missouri that requires students in 2nd and 3rd grade to write legibly (print, cursive).

In response to a similar proposal, HB 108 (2021), officials from the Fordland R-III School District, High Point R-III School District and the Shell Knob 78 School District each assumed the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations.

In response to a similar proposal, HB 54 (2019), the **Springfield Public Schools** stated it would cost \$85,000 in materials, assessments and teacher time.

Oversight notes the English Language Arts Missouri Learning Standards for K-5 include a standard for Grade 2 and Grade 3 to "write legibly (print, cursive)".

This proposal provides that school districts and charter schools <u>may</u> provide instruction in cursive writing to all students by the end of fifth grade and ensure that each student passes a teacher-constructed test demonstrating competency in both reading and writing cursive.

Based on the cost estimate provided by the Springfield Public Schools and the district's 4th and 5th grade enrollment numbers, **Oversight** estimates a per student cost of approximately \$21 (\$85,000/4,087).

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The statewide total enrollment as of January 2025 for Grade 4 and Grade 5 is 129,974. Assuming a per student cost of \$21, **Oversight** estimates the cost if a school chose to implement this proposal at \$2,729,454. However, Oversight notes some districts indicated there would be no fiscal impact from this proposal; therefore, Oversight will show a cost of \$0 (chose not to establish program) or less than \$2,729,454.

Oversight received no responses from school districts related to the fiscal impact of this proposal. Oversight has presented this fiscal note on the best current information available. Upon the receipt of responses, Oversight will review to determine if an updated fiscal note should be prepared and seek the necessary approval to publish a new fiscal note. Oversight only reflects the responses received from state agencies and political subdivisions; however, other school districts were requested to respond to this proposed legislation but did not. A listing of political subdivisions included in the MOLIS database is available upon request.

Rule Promulgation

Officials from the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules** assume this proposal is not anticipated to cause a fiscal impact beyond its current appropriation.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** notes many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$5,000. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, the SOS also recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with the core budget. Therefore, SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

This act provides that school districts and charter schools may provide instruction in cursive writing to all students by the end of fifth grade and ensure that each student passes a teacher-constructed test demonstrating competency in both reading and writing cursive.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
