Bill Summary: This proposal modifies provisions relating to state funds for Regional Planning Commissions.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

§251.034 – Regional Planning Commissions

Officials from the **Office of Administration - Budget and Planning (B&P)** assume this legislation increases the amount of state funds Missouri regional planning commissions can receive under §251.034, RSMo. Under this legislation, the annual funding cap for the East-West Gateway Coordinating Council and Mid-America Regional Council regional planning commissions is raised from \$65,000 to \$130,000, while the remaining seventeen regional planning commission's annual funding caps are each increased from \$25,000 to \$50,000.

Regional planning commissions' funding is subject to appropriation, so B&P assumes state costs could rise anywhere from \$0 - \$555,000 in fiscal year 2027. Further, the legislation mandates annual funding caps be adjusted with the consumer price index beginning July 1, 2026, and each year after, so state costs could rise anywhere from \$0 - \$577,200 in fiscal year 2028 and from \$0 - \$599,844 in fiscal year 2029, assuming an inflation rate of 2% each year.

B&P assumes increased state distributions to regional planning commissions will be funded through the General Revenue fund, as these grants are currently funded through General Revenue in Section 5.315 of HB 5 (2026).

Officials from the **Department of Economic Development** and **Missouri Department of Transportation** each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations. **Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note for these agencies.

Officials from the **Southeast Missouri Regional Planning and Economic Development Commission** assume the bill as filed increases the statutory cap of funding the state is able to provide to Regional Planning Commissions in the state as a one to one match with local funds as well as set a CPI increase to this cap moving forward. Actual funding is still subject to the annual state appropriation process and therefore has no immediate impact to the state budget.

Officials from the **Harry S. Truman Coordinating Council (HSTCC)** assume the proposal increases the maximum annual state allocation for Regional Planning Commissions (RPC) from \$25,000 to \$50,000. For HSTCC, this represents a 100% increase in core operating funds that support transportation planning, economic development coordination, environmental review, hazard mitigation planning, and grant assistance across Barton, Jasper, Newton, and McDonald Counties. This increase helps offset the significant rise in operating costs experienced over the past several years. The U.S. Consumer Price Index has increased more than 20% since 2020, while Missouri RPC funding has remained unchanged for decades. The adjustment restores purchasing power and allows HSTCC to maintain essential regional services without shifting additional burden to local governments.

The proposal also introduces an annual CPI-based adjustment beginning July 1, 2026. Using long-term CPI averages of 2.5–3% per year, HSTCC anticipates stable, predictable growth that will help sustain staffing and reduce inflationary gaps.

Finally, the proposal formally adds HSTCC to the list of recognized Regional Planning Commissions in statute. This strengthens their eligibility for statewide planning programs and affirms their role serving more than 200,000 residents and 67 communities.

Overall, the fiscal impact is positive: a \$25,000 annual increase in direct funding, with predictable inflation adjustments in future years, supporting continued delivery of regional planning and grant services.

Oversight notes the Regional Planning Commissions receive funds from the Office of Administration and are required to be matched with local funds. This proposal doubles those limits and also provides for adjustments with the consumer price index beginning July 1, 2026. Oversight will reflect amounts “Up to” the proposed new amounts as these are caps, not actual appropriations. Oversight will use an inflation rate of 2% to calculate the amounts for FY 2028 and beyond.

Upon the receipt of additional responses, Oversight will review to determine if an updated fiscal note should be prepared and seek the necessary approval to publish a new fiscal note. FISCAL IMPACT – Small Business

No direct fiscal impact on small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

Under current law, state funds for the East-West Gateway Coordinating Council and for the Mid-America Regional Council are not to exceed \$65,000 and state funds for other regional planning commissions shall not exceed \$25,000. This act changes the sums to \$130,000 and \$50,000.

Additionally, this act removes the regional planning commissions of Show-Me, Missouri Valley, Ozark Gateway, ABCD, and Lakes County and adds Harry S. Truman, MO-Kan, Pioneer Trails, and Southwest Mo.

Finally, this act provides that beginning July 1, 2026, the maximum grant amount for each regional planning commission shall be adjusted with the consumer price index.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
