FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

This proposal would eliminate governmental instrumentalities from participating in the Missouri Consolidated Health Care Plan. This proposal would also establish an annual effective date of January 1 as the date in which to begin a newly enrolled participating member agency's coverage. Currently, new agencies can begin coverage on the first day of any given month as requested by the agency and approved by the board. The proposal would also remove the board's ability to allow a participating member agency to come back into the state plan until two years have expired. Currently, an agency terminating its coverage is not eligible for participation in the state plan for two years unless a majority of the board votes otherwise.

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DESCRIPTION (continued)

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
