FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

This proposal would require compliance with federal law in drug labeling. The current language in Section 196.100, RSMo, regarding drug labeling, would be removed. New language would provide that any manufacturer, packer, distributor, or seller of drugs or devices must comply with current federal labeling law. Any drug or device with non-compliant labeling would be deemed misbranded.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
